FIFTY BOOSTERS BOOST.

Organization Effected Whose Purpose Is to Boost.

McMinnville Telephone-Register: Fifty young men ranging in years from 21 to 60 full of life and energy and willing to use it, full of enthusiasm and willing to let people know it, full of hopefulness and willing to show it—(excuse our lapse into poetry)—full of "go" and willing to make things move—this is what McMinnville is looking for now. A meeting was held in the city hall last Friday evening to organize a club, whose object is the betterment of everything relating to the city's welfare.

If the spirit manifested at this first meeting is characteristic of that which will prevail in all future meetings, the world will soon forget to "Keep Its Eye on Pasco," or "Watch Tacoma Grow," and will stand in mute astonishment at the brilliant achievements of McMinnville, the Gem of the Valley of the Yamhill.

Many matters, great and small, came in for a share of attention. Some were only referred to in a casual manner, some were placed in the hands of committees with instructions to investigate and report, some were decided upon at the time. One of the latter is the placing of a public drinking fountain on Third street. Dr. G. S. Wright has volunteered to place a neat fountain in front of his building, provided the city will furnish the water—a good example that should be followed by one or two others on different parts of the street.

The matters still under advisement are not made public, as the organization desires to be known as The-Club-That-Does-Things, and not as an aggregation of individuals whose only stock in trade is hot air and whose undertaking never gets beyond the embryonic state.

The club organized by electing Mayor W. F. Maey chairman and W. F. Dielschneider secretary, to serve until a constitution is adopted and a permanent organization effected. The membership will be limited to fifty, and an invitation from the membership committee, as well as a ballot by the members, will be necessary for admission to the club. The club meets every Friday evening.

Missouri Forests Gone.

The forests will soon be a thing of the past in Missouri. The lumbermen, the tie men, the home-builders and the fuel-users have eaten great gaps in the acres of yellow and white pine and other woods that have stood for years as the crown of the southern counties of the state. Sawmills are without occupation in localities where five years ago they were busy night and day. The forest counties of Southern Missouri have been partially denuded of their fine lumber and only an occasional effort has been made to replace it. The federal government has taken an interest in the reforesting of the denuded lands, and President Roosevelt's chief of forestry, Gifford Pinchot, has sent special representatives to Missouri to investigate and report upon conditions in the former forest fields. The Missouri agricultural college has been asked to co-operate with the federal government in this investigation, as it has done in cattle feeding and other work to great benefit to the state. It is desired to ascertain whether reforesting is feasible and advisable, and, if so, how it should be done, and with what trees. If reforesting is not possible and desirable, then it is expected that the investigation will disclose what is the best use to which to put the land which is left here by the woodman's ax. In some sections a preliminary survey indicates that there should be reforesting. In other sections dairy farming, fruit farming, pasturage, will probably be advised.

Wayne county has led in the shipment of lumber. Butler, Curtis, Reynolds, Ripley, Iron, Stoddard, Madison, Phelps, Dent, Pemiscot, Perry, Dunklin and other counties have shared in the loss which the output of lumber has occasioned. In some counties the forests have been cut down and the land immediately devoted to cultivation. This is particularly true in the lowlands along the rivers and small streams. On the pine lands, however, the disappearance of the forests has not been often followed by the use of the broad acres for other commercial purposes. What to do with the deforested lands of Missouri is a serious problem that the student of Missouri's economic conditions must solve.

Mr. Guln is a Salem man but has been in the service of the government for many years.

As the water gets lower the boat will work down the river and will probably finish up the season on the Columbia between Vancouver and Astoria. The working field of the boat is the Columbia and the tributaries.
