VARIOUS MILITARY DOINGS

Generals Miles and Elliott, Admiral Lyon and New Jersey Grand Army

General Miles Orator of the Day. Lincoln, Neb., June 14.—The annual commencement exercises of the Nebraska State University will be held this afternoon and evening. General Nelson A. Miles will be the principal orator of the day.

Major General of Marines.

Washington, D. C., June 14.—General George F. Elliott, the commandant of the marine corps, will probably be made a major general, at least a provision to this effect is contained in the naval bill as it has been reported from the naval committee. General Elliott has been urging the department to give the commandant the rank of major general on the ground that he commands officers and men which exceed that ordinarily under the control of a major general in the army; and with the additions which have been made to the marine corps, together with the responsibilities devolving upon the commandant of that branch, it is agreed that the request for an advance of rank is justified. At the same time the provision in the bill is so worded that it would give the present incumbent the rank of major general, to his successors only the rank of brigadier-general.

Transfer of Admirals.

Washington, June 14.—The navy department has decided to order Rear Admiral Henry W. Lyon to command Mare Island navy yard, vice Admiral McCalla, who retires this month. Admiral Lyon is at present commandant of the naval station on Hawaii.

New Jersey G. A. R. Encampment.

Paterson, N. J., June 14.—The annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic of this state opened here this morning with a business session. The attendance is quite large and the city is full of strangers who have been attracted by the encampment. The grand parade will be held this afternoon and it is expected that several hundred veterans will be in line. Other military and civic organizations will also take part in the parade. The line of march is nearly four miles long, and as many of the veterans are too feeble to march so long a distance arrangements have been made for carriages in which they will ride. A large reviewing stand has been erected in front of the city hall, and there the marchers will be reviewed by the commanding officer and his staff, the mayor, and a large number of prominent officials and invited guests.

MADE GOOD INDIANS

Veterans of Indian Wars in Oregon Hold Annual Meeting in Portland

Portland, June 14.—(Special.)—The 21st grand encampment of the Indian War Veterans of the North Pacific coast was held yesterday at the White Temple, Grand Commander H. D. Mount presiding. The following are the officers: Grand commander, H. D. Mount; senior commander, A. G. Lloyd; junior vice commander, Captain Ralph Blescoe; grand adjutant, Otto Klee-man; assistant adjutant, J. E. Morgan; grand chaplain, W. D. Ewing; grand paymaster, S. M. Parish; grand marshal, George W. Miller; grand surgeon, Amos Underwood; captain of the guard, John Storán.

Fifteen deaths in the ranks were reported for the past year. A committee of veterans was sent to make a personal call on Comrade Samuel Wilson, one of the oldest veterans, 90 years old who was unable to be at the meeting, and later they reported his pleasure over the compliment. A resolution was passed that the convention petition congress to put the Indian War veterans on an equal footing with the Grand Army veterans on the pension roll.

After sundry business an adjournment was taken to the banquet room down stairs, where tables had been arranged with a tempting feast for the veterans. Mrs. C. Henry Schambrau, daughter of the grand commander, is president of the Sons and Daughters. There were seven tables, each with a different color scheme. The first table was in charge of Miss Tillie F. Cornelius and the oldest veterans and the officers were seated there. The table was decorated with Indian baskets of crimson rambler roses and maiden hair fern, and at each place was a red rose. Her assistants were Mrs. S. C. Van Horn, Mrs. Thomas Reynolds, Mrs. Laura Johnson and Mrs. Gus Fanno.

Mrs. A. J. McDaniels had charge of the next table, with American Beauty roses and ferns. A rose corresponding to the color scheme of each table was placed at each place for souvenirs. Mrs. McDaniels' assistants were Mrs. G. F. White and Mrs. M. M. McDaniels. Mrs. Frank E. Watkins' table was very pretty with huge bunches of La France roses. Her helpers were Mrs. George Watkins, Mrs. E. A. Austin and Mrs. C. W. Martyn. Mrs. A. C. Gowdy had the yellow table and assisting her were Mrs. M. Steele, Mrs. W. E. Edwards and Mrs. C. Taylor. The white table was in charge of Mrs. H. E. Chipman, with Miss Emma Elgin and Mrs. N. Monical as helpers. Mrs. Clara Klee-man had red and white roses and was helped by Mrs. F. Benedict and Mrs. M. Young. Mrs. Mamie Wickersham, Miss Rose Donaldson and Miss Mary Johnson had a pink and white table. Mrs. Minnie MacGregor was chairman of the refreshment committee. TWENTY THOUSAND SHEEP LOST

This is the estimate for Umatilla and Morrow Counties.

Pendleton, Or., June 14.—It is conservatively estimated by Umatilla county sheepmen that at least 20,000 head of sheep perished during the recent high water and heavy snows in the mountains in Umatilla and Morrow counties.

While the aggregate loss in the two counties is heavy, yet the individual losses are so light that they will not be noticed in the volume of business of the year.

At least one-half of the number which perished was lambs, the others being newly shorned sheep which were caught in the high mountains soon after shearing. As all the sheep men in both counties enjoyed a large percentage of lambs this year they are not complaining. The loss by the cold weather is but little more than would have been occasioned by a week's cold weather during lambing season.
