

OLD WILLAMETTE GRADUATES STUDENTS

Class of 1906 Goes Forth to Battle With the World---Interesting Exercises Held Last Night at M. E. Church

Once again Old Willamette has sent into the world another graduating class to battle with sterner problems than those of the class room. Yesterday these young men and women were of the student world; today they are of the larger world, and must meet its responsibilities and do their share of the world's work.

Determined of success, buoyant with the joys of youth, filled with courage, the class of 1906 enters the world's arena amid the plaudits of friends who wish them abundant success and happiness.

The exercises were held in the First M. E. church, and the auditorium and gallery were filled. Parents, friends, fellow students all were there to witness the last exercises in which the members of the class of 1906 were to take part as students.

The choir loft was beautifully decorated with evergreen ferns and marguerites, and in the background the class numerals were cleverly woven out of marguerites. The decoration scheme, though simple, was particularly attractive.

Preceded by ushers chosen from the junior class, Rev. J. H. Coleman, president of the University; Dean W. C. Hawley, of the College of Liberal Arts; Rev. G. W. Grannis and Professor W. H. McCall, followed by the members of the graduating class, attired in caps and gowns, entered the auditorium and took their seats on the platform.

After a piano solo by Miss Joy Turner, the invocation was given by Rev. G. W. Grannis, of Pittsburg, Pa. In a few well-chosen remarks President Coleman introduced Hon. W. C. Hawley, who made the occasional address, which was a scholarly and brilliant effort.

Dean Hawley's Address.

Dean Hawley's address centered around the theme "All the World's a Stage." He said that it was good for the mind and heart to pause occasionally and to get a glimpse of the great scenes in the world's drama, and from them to draw inspiration and courage for the work that is before. The first scene in the drama was Moses giving the decalogue to the world. Here were given the right ideas of God and man's relation to the deity. The children of Israel were a people without art, but in them was developed the beauties of the inner life. What is the worth of

the attainments of hands prompted by selfish ambitions, when compared with those of heart and brain?

His second picture was that of Greece, with its architecture and literature. Here buildings and edifices towering in splendor was the work of the race. Beauty was righteousness and ugliness was sin. The Greeks accomplished their purpose, but that splendid nation has passed into obscurity.

The third scene was the birth of Christ among the Judean hills, and the benign influences that have radiated from that event.

Roman law and Teutonic individuality was pictured in the fourth scene. Here it was a struggle by the invaders to conquer the empire, but the law conquered them instead.

The fifth scene was the council of Nicea and the Roman bishops, and the influences of that event upon the thought of the world.

The sixth picture was the Magna Charta, and the rights of the people won at Runnymede. Here was the dawn of liberty and of individual rights.

Martin Luther and his fight for pure, undefiled religion, for religious tolerance was the seventh scene.

The closing event of the drama was the discovery and colonization of America. Here the cavalier, the Huguenot, the Puritan, the Catholic found a place of refuge from persecution. In America, indeed, is to bloom the greatest civilization. In wealth America's growth has been phenomenal. From 13 struggling colonies it has grown into a nation of 105,000,000 of people.

The universities and colleges are the mediums by which the lessons of the past are transmitted to our young men and young women. It is the work of the university to uproot the bad, and to pour in the good things of the past. The work of the fathers must be taken up and finished by the present generation.

In closing the speaker said "all ages have gone and unborn hopes have been realized, but now is the demand urgent. Opportunities are lying at your feet. In the name of the church and the University, I ask that you bear in mind the lessons of the heroic past, that you may bear fruit and that glory and honor may crown your years."

G. W. Grannis Speaks.

At the conclusion of the address, which was heartily applauded, Miss Mildred Bagley played a selection on the piano, after which Rev. G. W. Grannis was asked to make a few remarks. The speaker stated that the occasion afforded him great pleasure, and that he rejoiced to be present at these exercises, not only because he was particularly interested in one member of the class, but rather because of the love he had for the old school. He predicted that the remarkable progress of the past four years was only the commencement of larger things and greater achievements by the University. He congratulated the president, faculty and students in their earnest efforts in behalf of the school and urged those interested in the University to do their part honestly, and to put forth their most earnest efforts.

Degrees Are Conferred.

President Coleman addressed the class and conferred the degrees. He said in part: "In behalf of the University, board of trustees and friends here assembled, I congratulate you on the completion of your course. Never before have you had so many friends willing to assist you and pray for your success. There is something about the graduate that the world loves." (Applause). He expressed the hope that classes would soon graduate from new buildings in both the College of Law and Liberal Arts.

The degrees conferred were as follows:

Bachelor of Science—Silvia M. Jones, Gervais.
Bachelor of Letters—Frank M. Grannis, Salem; Gustena A. Randall, Oregon City; Mrs. R. G. Breeden, Salem.
Bachelor of Arts—Ruth Field, Salem.
Bachelor of Laws—Ronald Glover, Albany; Clinton H. Medcalf, Montezuma, Washington.

No honorary degrees have been conferred since 1903.

One of the touching things in the ceremony was the presentation of a beautiful gold ring, by Frank Grannis, in behalf of the class of 1906, to Prof. W. C. Hawley.

President Coleman made a brief summary of the financial condition of the

University, and of the gifts made to it by friends the past year.

After the benediction by the president of Puget Sound University, an informal reception was tendered the graduates in the lecture room, where flowers in profusion and gifts were presented to the class.

Thus closed one of the happiest and most important commencements ever held at the "old Methodist U."

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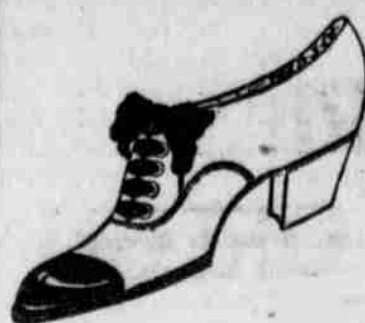

RETURNS COMING SLOW

Four Counties Have Still no Official Count of the Election

The official vote of the recent election is coming in to the office of secretary of state slowly. No returns whatever have been received from Curry, Grant, Harney and Polk counties, and from Gilliam, Lincoln and Yamhill no returns have been received in regarding the county officers.

The secretary of state expects to have all the returns in by the next week.

In almost all the counties the officers elected are Republicans, though the Democrats have in counties elected the sheriff. Democratic sheriffs have been elected in more than any other officer.

The Democratic sheriffs are as follows: Baker, A. L. Rand; Benton, P. Burnett; Coos, W. W. Gage; Curry, W. J. Russell; Lane, Fred J. Polk; Samuel Grant; Umatilla, J. Taylor; Union, Frank P. Chiles. Unofficial returns give the Democrats the sheriff in Malheur and the Democrats claim the election of Tom Word, a Democrat in Maham county, although the certificate election has been given to Stevens, a Republican.
