A BILL.

Ordinance No. 484.

An ordinance to require all per-
sons in the city of Salem, Oregon, to
use water from the mains of the Salem Water Co.
for the purpose of irrigation during
the continuance of fires.

Enacted by the Common Council
of the City of Salem, Oregon:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for
any person, in the City of Salem, Or-
e, to use any water from the pipes
of the Salem Water Co., for the
purpose of irrigation during the
continuance of any fire to which
the fire department of the City
of Salem, Oregon, may be called by a
fire alarm, and immediately upon
sounding of such general alarm
such irrigation shall cease until
the time as such fire is extinguished.

Section 2. Any person violating the
provisions of this ordinance shall be
guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on
conviction thereof before the
Recorder, shall be punished by a
fine of \$2.50 for the first offense and
\$5.00 for each subsequent offense.

DEMAND
DOLLAR
WHEATFarmers' Convention in Chi-
cago Declares for Better
Prices for Farm Products

Advices from Chicago say that sev-
eral thousand farmers from Iowa, Il-
linois, Indiana, Missouri, Nebraska,
the Dakotas, Minnesota, Oklahoma
and other wheat raising states are at-
tending the convention of the Ameri-
can society of equity, an organization
intended to advance the interests of
the farmer.

The chief cry of the meeting is
"dollar wheat" and emphatic protests
are made against millers, warehouses,
commission firms and railroads for
combinations against the farmer. The
society claims that the combination
of exporters keeps down the price of
wheat and that the market of the
world justifies \$1 per bushel to the
producer.

Another leading topic is the estab-
lishment of co-operative warehouses
throughout the country for the hand-
ling of the wheat crop direct from the
farmer to the wholesaler and thus elim-
inating needless expenses of middle
men.

The manufacturer of casks and the
transportation and freight rate prob-
lems will be discussed by some of the
ablest men in the organization and it
is possible that the convention will
take steps to extend the organization
to all the wheat growing states of the
west and northwest, for mutual pro-
tection.

The advance in the price of sacks
has caused farmers in the middle west
to protest and this matter will form
one of the leading topics in the Chi-
cago convention.

A Chicago dispatch says of the
meeting and its objects:

Farmers from the middle west have
been arriving in Chicago since Mon-
day, and more are to come tomorrow
morning. The tillers of the soil are
here to attend the opening session of
the American Society of Equity, which
was officially convened this after-
noon at the Great Northern hotel. The
society, which has as its main feature
the controlling of the prices of farm-
ers' products, was organized as a per-
manent society with a large member-
ship.

The farmers expect to arrange
plans and appointed committees at
today's meeting to draw up such plans
so that they can own elevators and
cold storage plants, thereby eliminating
middlemen's profits and sell direct to
wholesale dealers in the cities.

"Dollar Wheat" is their slogan,
but wheat is not the only thing for
which the farmers expect to dictate
their price, instead of having it dic-
tated by corporations and other large
buyers.

for High Jinks

The "Elks' Skidoo," let it be
known now, is going to be one of the
really few good things in the amuse-
ment line that has ever been attempt-
ed in Salem town. The large store
building at the corner of State and
Commercial streets is the scene of ac-
tivity these days. The ripping of the
saw and the sound of the hammer is
the sweet music that greets the ear
of the passers by.

Naturally, there are scores of sur-
prises and dazzling features in store
for the visitors of the Skidoo. The
building has already been segregated
and divided for the various booths.
The stage for the up to date vaude-
ville has been erected and the menag-
erie is in process of construction and

ever seen in this classic city.

corating scheme will necessarily be red,
white and blue. But the rich colored
draperies of the Orient will be used

the Skidoo. The Trail, the Streets of

icance when compared to the Elks' Skidoo.

Among the attractions that will
dazzle the natives will be the "Rats-
cellar," where a continuous banquet
at 10 cents a plate will be had, "The
Country Store" will contain "unbe-
lievable bargains," we are told, and
no one doubts the statement.

Talk about amusements! The Ski-
doo will give you the latest, and the
sensationally attractive. The Elks "are
after the dough," and it will be forth-
coming because by all appearances
they intend "to deliver the goods."

San Francisco School Situation.

Thirty-four schools were burned af-
ter the earthquake of April 18, 1906.
As a consequence more than 400 teach-
ers and 20,000 children have no class
rooms.

The great destruction of property,
the extraordinary demands upon the
public purse in every direction, and the
absorption of individuals and officials
in their special interests, leave the
school authorities confronted with the
prospect of interminable delay in the
erection of new buildings unless out-
side aid is secured.

The following telegram was received
while the great fire was raging, and
the offer therein was gratefully ac-
cepted:

"Galveston, Tex., April 20, 1906.—
A. Roncovieri, Supt. Public Schools,
San Francisco, Cal.—Galveston public
schools were rebuilt and maintained af-
ter the great storm of 1900 by volun-
tary contributions from the school chil-
dren of the United States. Will you
accept contributions from Galveston
school children to aid in restoring your
public schools; answer. I. Lovenberg,
Supt. Schools. Jno. W. Hopkins, Pres.
School Board."

Many other generous subscriptions
have been received, and in order that
this movement may become known, the
mayor, the board of education and su-
perintendent of schools have been con-
stituted a committee to be called the
school reconstruction committee, em-
powered to receive such subscriptions
as may be tendered for the purpose of
rebuilding our destroyed schools.

For the present, schools are being
conducted in tents furnished by the U.
S. military authorities in Golden Gate
Park. Soldiers serve as trunk of
feet; a drill sergeant puts the boys
through setting up exercises. Stow
lake furnishes an opportunity for swim-
ming lessons, so that the boys and
girls are enjoying the summer season;
but the cold winds of the winter season
and the driving rains will transform
this enjoyment to misery. Temporary
structures must be utilized, but the
great need is expedition in the creation
of our permanent school houses.

The first cash contribution came from
the boys and girls of Broken Arrow,
Creek Nation, Indian Territory—a
beautiful illustration of the kinship of
the peoples of our beloved country.

Portland, Oregon, has sent us word
that her citizens will build for us a
school building to be named the Port-
land School.

San Francisco is a cosmopolitan city
to a degree hardly appreciated beyond
her gates, except by those thousands of
tourists who have learned to love our
beautiful city by the Golden Gate
through a brief sojourn in our midst.
The world, therefore, has an interest
in us to an unusual extent, and we can
