### A BILL.

#### Ordinance No. 484.

For an ordinance to require all per-  
sons in the city of Salem, Oregon, to  
obtain from using water from the  
pipes or mains of the Salem Water Co.  
the purpose of irrigation during  
continuance of fires.  
Enacted by the Common Council of the  
City of Salem, Oregon:  
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for  
any person, in the City of Salem, Or-  
egon, to use any water from the pipes  
or mains of the Salem Water Co., for  
purpose of irrigation during the  
continuance of any fire to which the  
fire department of the City of Sa-  
lem, Oregon, may be called by a  
general alarm, and immediately upon  
sounding of such general alarm  
such irrigation shall cease until  
such time as such fire is extinguished.  
Section 2. Any person violating the  
provisions of this ordinance shall be  
found guilty of a misdemeanor, and  
conviction thereof before the  
Recorder, shall be punished by a  
fine of \$2.50 for the first offense and  
\$1.00 for each subsequent offense.  
Enacted by the Council Friday, June  
15, 1906.

### PROPOSALS INVITED

Supplies for the Oregon State Pen-  
itentiary for Period Ending Decem-  
ber 31, 1906.  
Sealed bids for drugs, dry goods,  
clothes, leather and findings, plumb-  
ing supplies, flour, fish, meat, etc., will  
be received at the office of the super-  
intendent of the Oregon state peniten-  
tary until June 26, 1906, at 2 o'clock  
p. m., at which time they will be op-  
ened.  
A deposit of \$200.00 cash or certi-  
ficate, payable to the superintend-  
ent, must accompany each bid for  
flour and flour, and all other bids must  
be accompanied by an amount equal  
to 10 per cent of the amount of the  
bid.  
Samples to accompany all bids where  
so specified. The right is reserved to  
reject any and all bids and to accept  
any portion of a bid. On the en-  
velope should be inscribed the  
name of the bid. Goods of Oregon  
manufacture on production will re-  
ceive preference, other things being  
equal. All goods and supplies must  
be delivered to the penitentiary with-  
in 30 days after the contract is award-  
ed.  
Schedules of the various lines of  
freight will be furnished upon applica-  
tion to the superintendent.  
Vouchers will be issued for payment  
the first of the month following the  
completion of the contract, and month-  
ly or continuous contracts.  
Bidders will take notice that the  
appropriation for maintenance of the  
penitentiary is now available, and all  
bids for supplies after being audit-  
ed by the secretary of state will be  
paid by state warrants.

### Improving Sea Girt Rifle Range.

New York, June 18.—The war de-  
partment has been advised that the  
facilities at the target range at Sea  
Girt have been materially improved by  
the addition of forty Aiken targets,  
the invention of an Illinois militia  
marksman. This acquisition adds much

to the advantages of Sea Girt, where  
the big national match will be held  
in September, and for which the rifle  
teams of the state troops, the army,  
navy and marine corps, are now in  
training. There are indications that  
the coming national match will be  
the largest ever held in this country.  
More states will be represented than  
ever before; the army will send at  
least two teams, and the navy and ma-  
rine corps will each be represented by  
one team. The military academy will  
not be able to furnish a competing  
team, since the academy authorities  
find it impossible to train the cadets  
in marksmanship sufficient to warrant  
their appearance against the service  
and state teams. It has been decided  
not to send a team from the Naval  
academy, either, although the midship-  
men have been doing splendid work.  
The records made have attracted much  
attention among the marksmen who  
have visited Annapolis and shot against  
the midshipmen.

One young boy named Thompson, of  
the second class, the smallest boy in  
the naval academy, who had no previ-  
ous experience with a rifle, promises  
to be the best shot in the service. He  
gained special praise from the mem-  
bers of the 71st New York regiment  
team, which recently visited Annapo-  
lis. Sergeant Doyle, the famous shot  
of the 71st, is quoted by the midship-  
men as commending the work of the  
Annapolis boys. Lieutenant Colonel  
Foster S. Bonus, of the 6th cavalry,  
will be the executive officer of the na-  
tional match at Sea Girt.

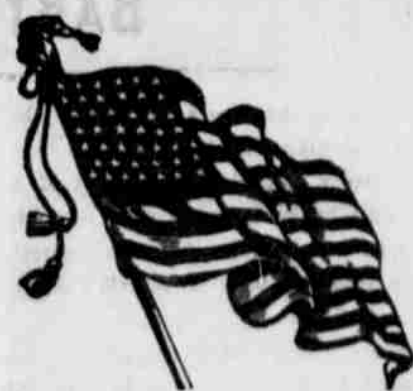
### At the Presbyterian Church.
