Pressmen Hold National Convention.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 18.--Nearly 300 locals of printing pressmen and assistants throughout the United States and Canada are represented by delegates at the national convention of pressmen and assistants, which opened here today at Maennerchor hall, Washington Heights. The delegates are quartered at the Monongahela House. A lively time is expected over the attempt of a local of pressmen in New York City, that was suspended by the international union, to seat delegates in the convention. It was formerly No. 51, but a charter has been granted to a new body of men for that number. The defunct union, during its fight with the international union, achieved notoriety by trying up the general fund by injunction, including the benefit, death and burial funds of the entire membership.

BRUTE ASSAULTS BABY

Saturday evening's Telegram has the following terrible story:

"Badly mutilated as a result of an assault by an unknown man, who kidnapped her from her home and carried her into the hills of South Portland the little 3-year-old daughter of H. J. Lavery, of 210 Harrison street, was found by a searching party late this afternoon.

"No trace could be found of the kidnapper and assailant, who is supposed by the police to be a woodchopper who was employed in the neighborhood of the child's home yesterday. The baby girl was placed immediately in the care of Dr. Cattel, who stated after making an examination that her condition was not serious, so far as he was able to tell at the time. She is suffering, severely, however, and is very ill.

The child was playing in the yard about noon today while the mother was preparing luncheon. Suddenly the mother missed the child and when search of the neighborhood failed to reveal her, she aroused the neighbors, and a searching party started out. After two hours the child was found in a copse half a mile or more from her home, lying on the ground half dazed. The tracks of a man could be seen.

Willamette Valley Traction Company Want Slight Change.

An ordinance will be introduced at the meeting of the council tonight, at the request of the Willamette Valley Traction Company, changing the route of their proposed line through the city. The new proposed route will enter the city from the south on Mill street and along High street to Broadway. It will follow that thoroughfare to the Riverside addition and through Highland Avenue addition in a northeasterly direction to the Bonham bridge. The new route follows the main direction of the old one, and the proposed change is made merely to straighten out the curves and to avoid turning sharp corners.

PERCY ALLEN CAPTURED.

Escape From Penitentiary Farm precluded at Scott's Mills. Percy Allen, who escaped from penitentiary farm Thursday night, captured at Scott's Mills Saturday is now again in prison. Friday Allen went to Thompson's camp, two miles above Scott's Mills and slept in a barn. His character suspected by Mr. Thompson, a named Vedder, who overpowered Saturday, tied him and guarded with shot guns until a guard from penitentiary could arrive. Deputy Warden Frank Curtis went after escaped prisoner and returned to penitentiary with him Saturday. Allen was sent up from Coos county in 1899 charged with a crime. He has served six and a half of his fifteen-year sentence made a trusty on account of his behavior. His credit marks were forfeited by his attempt to escape. The convict Young, who was from the road gang Thursday, is at large.
