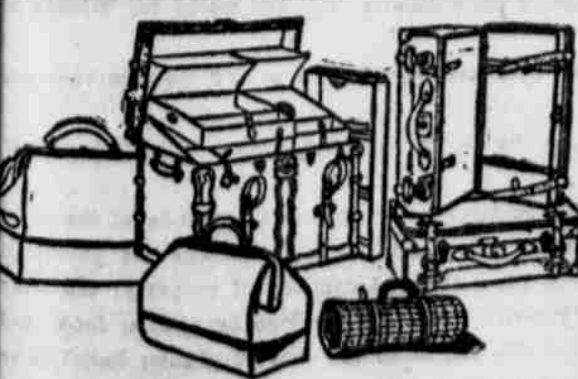

CAMPAnnual Campmeeting at Turn-
er Will Begin Next Thurs-
day Evening

The sixteenth annual session of the
Oregon Christian Missionary conven-
tion will begin at Turner Thursday,
June 21. The camp meeting will con-
tinue for ten days and the exercises
will be held in the large tabernacle at
Turner which was erected by the Tur-
ner heirs in memory of their parents.
The meeting will represent one hun-
dred congregations of the Christian
church in Oregon and delegates will be
present representing 10,000 members.
During the camp meeting session will
be held of the Ministerial Association,
Missionary Association, Women's
Board of Missions, Sunday School As-
sociation, Young People's Society of
Christian Endeavor and the Education-
al Union of the Christian church.

In connection with these meetings a
daily Bible institute will be conducted
by President E. C. Sanderson of the
Theological School of Eugene, and a
summer normal for Sunday school
workers will be conducted by Evangel-
ist J. P. Condon, of Portland.

Among the noted men who will be
present and who will take a public
part in the meetings are F. M. Rains,
of Cincinnati; Victor Doris, of George-
town, Ky.; R. P. Shepherd, of Berke-
ley, Cal.; A. L. Chapman, of Seattle.
Preparations have been made for at
least 500 people to camp on the grounds
and if it should become necessary these
preparations can be made to accommo-
date twice that number. It is expected
that on each of the two Sundays
that the camp meeting is in session
there will be at least 5000 people on
the grounds.

All of the sessions of the camp meet-
ing are public and everybody is invited
to attend.

IMPORTANT
MASONIC
ASSEMBLY

Boston, Mass., June 18.—This city
will be the scene of the two most im-
portant Masonic events of the year
during the present week and many of
the most distinguished officers of the
order are here to take part in the two
events. The first event, which is, in
some respects, the introduction to the
second, began this morning, when the
triennial assembly of the General
Grand Council of Royal and Select
Masters of the United States, opened
its triennial session at the Masonic
Temple. This is the ninth triennial
of the assembly, and one of the most im-
portant ever held. Tomorrow the twen-
ty-third triennial assembly of the
General Grand Royal Arch Chapter
of the United States will open its ses-
sions at the Masonic Temple.

The most elaborate preparations for
the double event have been made by
the local masons. The Hotel Brun-
wick has been selected as the head-
quarters of the delegates, and every-
thing is being done to add to the
comfort of the high officers of the
order. The business sessions of both as-
semblies will be held in the Masonic
Temple, and, to prevent loss of time,
it has been arranged that luncheon
will be served in the temple every day
while the assemblies are in session.

There will be many receptions, dinners
and other social functions during the
week, but the most important func-
tion will be the grand banquet at
Tremont Temple on Thursday evening.
A large number of the most distin-
guished Masons will attend the ban-
quet, and will deliver addresses. The
general topic of the addresses will be
"Free Masonry as a World Power."
The last triennial assembly of the
General Grand Chapter was held in
Little Rock, Ark. No triennial has
been held in Boston since 1859. The
General Grand Chapter of the United
States was established in Boston on
October 1797. The first session was
a convention of representatives of St.
Andrew's Chapter, of Boston, New-

buryport Chapter of Newburyport,
since renamed King Cyrus Chapter and
Temple Chapter of Albany, N. Y. There
were only seven Royal Arch Masons
present at that convention. The dele-
gates met in the old Masonic Temple
on Anne street, now North street, and
concluded to issue circulars to the
Royal Arch chapters of New England
and New York state, calling a meet-
ing in Hartford. This convention was
held in that city on January 24, 1798,
and there was completed the organiza-
tion of the General Grand Royal Arch
Chapter of the United States. They
selected as the first general grand high
priest Ephraim Kirby, of Connecticut.
He was installed by Benjamin Hurd, of
St. Andrews' chapter, of Boston, the
oldest grand high priest represented.
They also adopted a constitution, pro-
viding for septennial convocations.
Three convocations were held once ev-
ery seven years until 1826, when the
general grand constitution was amend-
ed and triennial convocations estab-
lished.

U. OF O. BUILDINGS.

Can Now Draw Down the \$65,000 Al-
lowed It.

Eugene, June 18.—Within a few
months the University of Oregon will
have a fine library building, as well
as additional books, apparatus and
equipment. The general appropriation
bill of the last legislature, which was
held up by the referendum and ap-
proved by the people, contains an ap-
propriation of \$65,000 for the univer-
sity. Of this amount \$32,000 is ap-
propriated for additional maintenance,
including much-needed repairs to the
building, improvement of the grounds,
the installation of a water plant, pur-

a building for library and class room
purposes, and the remaining \$33,000 is
chase of additional scientific appara-
tus, equipment and books.

The sum of \$25,000 is appropriated
for the construction and furnishing of
to be used for the construction of a
dormitory for women.
For the past two years the univer-
sity has managed to exist on its regu-
lar appropriation of \$47,500 per year,
although the teaching force has been
somewhat reduced, and many other in-
conveniences have been put up with.
During the present college year the en-
rollment of students has been larger
than ever before, and the capacity of
the university has been taxed to the
utmost.

Celebrating Bunker Hill Day.

Boston, Mass., June 18.—Yesterday
was Bunker Hill Day, but as it fell on
a Sunday the patriotic people of
Charleston will celebrate the anniver-
sary today. The celebrations began
this morning with an old-time parade
by members of the numerous social
clubs of the Bunker Hill district. It
was held under the auspices of the
Carnival Association, and consisted of
a large number of marchers in colonial
costumes and floats with grotesquely
attired groups.

In the afternoon there will be a mil-
itary parade, consisting of about 1000
men from the United States warships
in the harbor, marines from the navy
yard, several companies of coast artil-
lery from the forts, two regiments of
militia, high school battalion, G. A. R.,
sons of Veterans and Legion of Span-
ish War Veterans.

The principal event of the evening
will be an electrical parade with 16 il-
luminated floats, representing scenes
from Mother Goose rhymes and fairy-
land. It is expected that the celebra-
tion this evening will attract enor-
mous crowds from the surrounding dis-
tricts.
