ALBERT HOPF DEAD.

Well-Known Citizen Passes Away at Samaritan Hospital.

Albert Hopf died at the Samaritan hospital in this city Saturday afternoon of cancer of the throat. Mr. Hopf was 57 years old and had resided in this city fourteen years. He is survived by his wife and seven children. The children are: Mrs. William M. Hendren, of Seattle; Misses Pearl and Ruby Hopf and Albert and Rudolph Hopf, of Seattle, and Carl and Verna Hopf of this city. The children from Seattle arrived in Salem yesterday. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock and the interment will be in the City View cemetery.

Marriage Was a Failure.

A suit for divorce was instituted this morning in department No. 2 of the district court by Elnora Mae Goin, who asked to be separated from Jasper Lee Goin, on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. The Goins were married at Jefferson in 1892, and there are two children, Israel Lauren, 11 years old, and Opal Maud, aged 6. Mrs. Goin asks the custody of the girl and of the boy during the term of the public schools. She also asks the court to allow her \$5 for attorney fees and for the costs and disbursements of the suit.

In her complaint Mrs. Goin gives a long list of grievances. She said that on several occasions when she was sick her husband refused to provide medicine, and once she would have died had it not been for the charity of the neighbors. To this course of treatment he added the crime of jealousy and failure to provide sufficient food for herself and the children.
