The average age of the candidates was 26 years and 4 months; 13 were graduates from college; 21 possessed a secondary education, 20 were students of law schools and 14 had had office experience.

Certificates of admission will be issued to all except the last two, who are minors. Their certificates will be granted them when they become of age. There will be a re-examination at the October term for candidates who may wish to take it.

The mayor has ten days in which to sign or return with his veto a bill enacted by the council; but in this case Mayor Waters said he could see no use in delay, and he promptly signed the ordinance, and gave instructions to the marshal to put the new law in force.

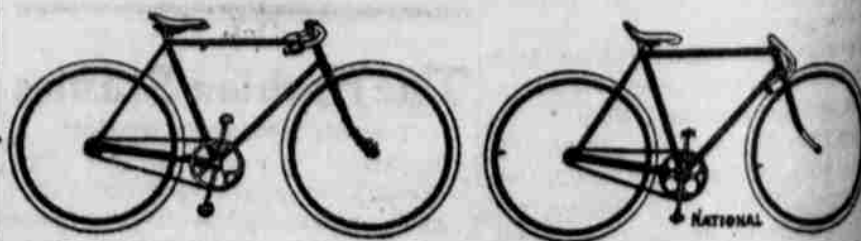
