RAIL
ROAD
TALK

This morning's Oregonian says:
 W. S. Barstow, treasurer of the Wil-
 lamette Valley Traction Company, and
 member of the engineering firm of Bar-
 stow & Company, which is constructing
 the new trolley road from Portland to
 Salem, has returned from New York,
 where he spent the past few months
 in making arrangements for material
 for the new line. Orders have been
 placed for rails, delivery of which has
 already begun.

"Now that the franchise question
 has been definitely settled," said Mr.
 Barstow, "the planning of branches
 from the main line will next be con-
 sidered. After the Salem line is in op-
 eration, the next extension will be to
 Albany. After that is built, the road
 will be pushed to Eugene. Branches
 from the main line are now under con-
 sideration, but there is nothing of a
 definite nature that can be given out.
 When the system is complete the Wil-
 lamette Traction will have a network
 of roads through the country tributary
 to Portland.

Drawing up the Bond.

"The bond we are required to give
 to the city as a guarantee of the con-
 struction of the road is now being
 drawn up. It amounts to \$100,000, as
 stipulated in the ordinance granting us
 a franchise, and will be ready to be
 given to the city early next week.

"We expect to have the line to Sa-
 lem in operation by July 1 of next
 year. The work will be rushed with
 all speed possible. The road will be
 one of light grades and curvature, and
 the cars are to be geared to a speed of
 35 miles an hour. We expect to make
 the schedule between Portland and Sa-
 lem, which is a distance of 40 miles
 over our survey, not over an hour and
 a half, including stops.

Will Make Fast Time.

"Several lines have been run, and
 every effort has been made to get long
 tangents and light curves. Three
 curves near Salem have recently been
 cut out, and just this side of that city

we have a stretch of straight track
 that is 21 miles long. The maximum
 grade for this distance is one-fourth
 of one per cent, and over that division
 of the road cars will make very fast
 time. Perhaps a mile-a-minute gait
 will be realized. Two per cent grade
 is the maximum on the whole line, with
 very little of that. For most of the
 way the grades are very slight."

Work on the road is progressing at
 the Salem end, and new construction
 equipment is continuously being pur-
 chased. The promoters believe that
 when complete the line will be the
 best piece of track in the state, and if
 the predictions of speed are realized
 the trolley road will certainly outspeed
 the railroads operating in this part of
 the country.

Summer School.

Miss Annie Biesen will open a sum-
 mer school for grammar grade pupils
 at the East school on Monday, June
 25th. Hours 8 to 12m. Tuition 5c
 per month.

Buying Horses for Japan.

Albert St. Clair, a horsebuyer from
 Japan, was in the city yesterday. He
 left this morning for Albany. He is
 engaged in buying horses for the Im-
 perial guard, and finds horses scarce
 due he believes, to the fact that far-
 mers have stopped raising horses since
 they became so cheap a few years ago.

He has been a resident of Japan for
 three years. Mr. St. Clair is an expert
 gunner and teaches the art to the little
 "brown men." He expects to return
 to the land of the Mikado in a few
 weeks, but will eventually return to
 the United States to make his home. He
 is pleased with Marion county.
