WORK FULL FORCE

Mutual Canning Factory Running at Its Present Full Capacity

The Salem Mutual Canning is now working at the full capacity of the present plant. One hundred and thirty women and girls are engaged this week in picking and packing strawberries and cherries. The season for strawberries will continue for another week and the season for early cherries is now in its height. The Royal Annes and the other late varieties will come in next week.

A considerable quantity of gooseberries are also being canned.

Public attention is being attracted to the factory on account of the proposition to extensively can Logan berries for the trade. Logan berries are an unknown quantity on the market and the business will come in the nature of an experiment. Manager Kendall desiring to be on the safe side, will only pay for Logan berries this year 2 1/4 cents, while raspberries are bringing 4 cents.

The excellence of the Logan berry will no doubt soon make it a favorite and very little time is expected to be required to introduce them into the market.

It is believed that the factory will be glad to continue canning the Logan berries as long as they are brought in. It is also believed that by next year the price of these delicious berries will be the same as raspberries.

The only thing in the way of a most successful season for the cannery will be the lack of small fruit in the city and vicinity. If the factory gets the encouragement that it should, there

is no reason why the capacity should not be doubled next year.

Hon. Jefferson Myers called at the cannery yesterday afternoon and arranged for the packing of a large exhibit of different goods, including all the varieties of berries and cherries which will go with the Oregon exhibit to the tercentennial exposition at James town exposition next year.

In this collection will be a fine lot of Logan berries and they will probably be the only Logan berries at the centennial.

Friends and stockholders in the cannery have great faith in the enterprise and believe that it will ultimately be one of the biggest enterprises in the state.
