WANT TREES REMOVED

A Correspondent Says the Trees in Willamette Campus are Unsightly

Salem, June 22, 1906.

To The Editor of The Capital Journal: A few days ago a correspondent in your paper made a plea for the retention of the unhealthy and unsightly trees along State street border of the Willamette University campus. I have no idea what influence, if any, public opinion will have on the college management regarding the trees, but I do hope that the college people will be sufficiently up to date to remove the trees, or at any rate to take most of them out. With a proper regard for the cultivation of shrubbery, in a few years the campus can be made into a very beautiful spot, but as these trees get larger and larger, they will crowd out everything else and will almost entirely obliterate the natural beauty of the grounds.

Most readers of your paper will remember that the grounds around the county court house were once in this same condition. Everything there was in a mass, but the trees were cut down and in a short time the grounds assumed their present beauty and cleanliness.

In a climate that has as much rainfall as this, large trees do not make as suitable shade trees on grounds of public buildings as smaller ones. In the State house grounds are trees that will eventually have to give way to shrubbery.

I hope that the university people will act in accordance with practical common sense and sanitary demands.

Sunday Problems for Sailors.

Washington, June 22.—The ships of the Atlantic fleet will spend the present summer much after the same fashion, so far as concerns cruising and exercises, as they did last year. The vessels will have their rendezvous at Provincetown, Mass., and will visit such places as Newport, R. I.; Rockport, Mass., and Rockland, Me., on cruises which will take up much of the time. Later there may be special exercises, and the season's work will end with target practice as usual on the ranges off Provincetown.

No one in the navy department knows exactly what Rear Admiral Evans intends to do with his large force of enlisted men on Sundays. It seems probable that the ships will find it convenient to be at some other port than Provincetown, so that the men may indulge in baseball and other harmless diversions on Sunday afternoons without giving offence to residents, as threatens to be the case in Provincetown. The inhabitants of that place, however, are by no means unanimous against Sunday baseball for the navy, and those who have spoken for a strict observance of the day have incurred a harsh sort of criticism from those of their own townspeople who think that some respectable means of employing the leisure time of blue-jackets must be allowed on shore on Sundays after their usual church services on board ship.

WOOL CLIP HERE

This Year's Crop of Wool Coming in to the Salem Mills

The management of the Salem Woolen Mills says that this year's wool clip is beginning to come into the factory. Manager Kay purchases wool from the Willamette valley, eastern Oregon and southern Oregon. The grades of wool in each of these places is different and all grades are required in the manufacture of the different styles of textiles that the factory turns out.

Wool is selling this year at prices ranging from 25 cents per pound for the best, down to 18 or 20 cents. This is considered a good price, although it is somewhat lower than the prevailing prices of last year.

The high prices for wool for the past year has been so high that it has taken a large slice of the profits of the manufacturers. The factory people manufacture most of their goods by contract and it is sometimes rather inconvenient to base estimates for a big contract on 18-cent wool and then next season have to fill this contract with wool that costs 25 cents.

This year the Salem Woolen Mills do not have to contend with conditions of this kind, because the contracts made last year were based on prices of wool that were about as they are this year.
