Haakon Is Fitted With a New Lid

The king, accompanied by his aides, walked to the altar, where Bishop Westren anointed him. The prayers were similar to those offered when Oscar II. was crowned, but the symbols were more simple.

The congregation joined in singing part of the services which resembled a religious ceremony rather than a coronation. Throughout the queen appeared frightened and did not join in the singing as did the king.

During the whole services all the church bells in Norway rang. At its conclusion, at 2 o'clock, royal salutes of 21 guns were fired in every Norwegian port.

This evening Haakon gave a banquet to 400 guests, including the special embassies. Tomorrow there will be a concert for the guests, and Sunday a children's parade to the church. Receptions will be held next Tuesday and Wednesday, when the king will return to Christiansia. During the coronation the king wore the uniform of an admiral, and the queen a brilliant robe of white and gold. The Princess of Wales was dazzling in a décolleté costume of deep gold, blazing with gems.

VISIT SOUTHERN OREGON

State Fair Representatives Are Highly Pleased With State Fair Situation

President W. H. Downing and Secretary Frank W. Durbin returned yesterday from their trip to the southern part of the state in the interest of the state fair, and particularly the county exhibits.

"Southern Oregon shows much more interest in the state fair this year than it has ever done before," said Mr. Downing this morning. "All that part of the state is realizing that the fair is not for Salem in particular, but that the intention is to make the state fair a state institution in fact as well as in name. We feel that Southern Oregon will be well represented, because they all see where they have been benefited by the Lewis and Clark fair. We have had a pleasant trip, and Mr. Durbin and I have been royally received."

At Ashland Messrs. Downing and Durbin placed the claims of the state fair before the Commercial Club, which passed resolutions asking the county court to make a liberal appropriation for a first-class county exhibit. At Medford great enthusiasm prevailed for the fair, and the board of trade voted \$100 to assist in the preparing of a county exhibit. We also met the county judge. He, too, was deeply interested personally, and he will use his best efforts to the end that an appropriation be made by the county court. Jackson county will have an exhibit that will make other counties sit up and take notice," said President Downing.

While in Roseburg the state officials met those of the Southern Oregon district fair, and exchanged ideas on various matters. The Roseburg fair is held a week before the state fair, and with but a small appropriation, much of the exhibit from Douglas county could be sent to Salem, and it is possible that the county will decide to do so.

Lane and Linn counties have already arranged for their exhibits, and work on the grounds will begin immediately. The plan is to put a number of convicts at work, and repair the fences and clean up the grounds thoroughly. The interior of the large pavilion will be renovated and repainted, and several statues from the Lewis and Clark exposition set up on the grounds. These will add much to the general appearance of the premises. The track, too, is in fine condition, and the prospects for some great racing events are tinged with the brightest coloring. Frank Durbin is giving his attention particularly to the speed program.
