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INTERPRETING MRS. EDDY.

One Elbert Hubbard, who made Ivory soap famous as its advertising agent, has since set up as moral reformer and professional dispenser of philosophy. He often takes a sly at Mary Baker Eddy, the religious light of Concord, New Hampshire, and generally hostile. NOW HE USES HER AS THE COMMERCIAL MATERIAL FOR ONE OF HIS "LITTLE JIMMY" BOOKLETS and advertises it widely.

Of course, like many other good people, he catches onto a popular thing TO MAKE IT YIELD HIM PROFIT, AND IS QUITE CHARITABLE TO THE LEADER OF THE CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS. Among other things he says:

"There is an adage to the effect that a prophet is not without honor save in his own country. An adage is sometimes true and sometimes not. In the case of Mary Baker Eddy the adage just quoted goes awry.

"Mrs. Eddy has the good will of Concord, and very many of the leading men and women of the city are Christian Scientists.

"Up to ten years ago the Billingsgate Calendar was sent suddenly on all occasions in her direction. Now Mrs. Eddy has won, and legislation and courts have whistled in their bounds. You right to keep well in your own way is fully recognized. Doctors are not liable when they give innocent sweetened water and call it medicine, nor do we place Christian Scientists on trial if their patients die, any more than we do the M. D.'s. Mrs. Eddy has tinted the entire so-called sciences of both medicine and theology. Even those who deny her and noisily discard her are debtors to her.

"Homeopathy modified the dose of all the allopaths; and Christian Science has nearly eliminated the Hahnemanian theory of attenuations, it having been found that the blank tablet cures quite as effectively as the one that is medicated.

"Christian Science has made greater head in the 30 years of its existence than Christianity made in its first thousand years. The statement of Heine, that Christianity is a religion of sorrow was a point well made. But Christian Science is a religion of joy. Christian Scientists are not preparing to die.

"Christian Science does not shout, rant, defy or preach. It is poised, silent, sure, and the flagellants, like the dervishes, are noticeable by their absence. The Rev. Billy Sunday is not a Christian Scientist. The Christian Scientist does not cut into the grape; specialize on the elevated spheroid; devote his energies to bridge whist; cultivate

While there is little public appreciation of the teaching profession in one way, in another way the up-to-date educator of high standards in the profession is in great demand.

MANY TEACHERS GET POOR PAY BECAUSE THEY DO NOT FULLY RISE TO THE PRIVILEGES OF THEIR POSITION.

To be a real leader of the young, to have accomplishments, to take the place allotted the educator in the community, the teacher must not be satisfied with a mastery of examination questions.

Successful teachers in this strenuous age are a well-dressed man and woman who walk erect and are fully alive to the dignity and importance of their calling.

Wireless for the Artillery.

Washington, June 25.—Artillery officers in the vicinity of New York who have use for wireless telegraphy are much interested in the prospect that a new system, cheaper than anything yet devised or constructed, will be turned out by the army signal corps. The Southern Artillery District of New York is the only district where wireless telegraphy is used to any extent, it being the practice to communicate between the shore and the boats connected with the targets in the practice with big guns. It is found that it would be too expensive to extend the same system to all the artillery districts of the country in the hope of finding some means of exchanging messages between shore stations and boats off shore.

The wireless telegraph systems so far presented are costly, but it is hoped by using commercial material to get up a system which is not too expensive. In addition to this effort on the part of the signal corps officers an officer of the artillery branch has just completed a device for visual signalling. He has constructed a huge shutter, the slats of which are a foot wide and so painted that when operated by a lever the colors will be shown to a distant observer, and by this means simple signals can be given. Of course, this is not so satisfactory as wireless telegraphy, but it was regarded as worth trying, and the war department has allotted \$2000 for experiments with the device. These tests will be conducted in Boston harbor. If the signal corps people succeed in getting a cheap wireless outfit, there will be no need of the artillery officer's huge shutter.

New Banking House for Havana.

New York, June 25.—Interests identified with the National City bank, with which are associated important London and Paris interests, are organizing a new financial institution in Havana, to be known as the Banque de la Havana. The bank, which will be chartered under the laws of Cuba, is to have a paid-up capital of \$2,500,000. It is expected that it will begin operations in the early fall. The list of directors is practically made up, but the names can not yet be learned. The officers have not been definitely selected, except the cashier, J. C. Martins, now assistant manager of the bond department of the National City bank. Mr. Martins who is a native of Cuba, has sailed for Havana to take charge of the details of the organization of the new institution.

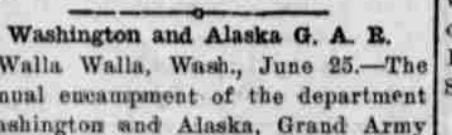
While the meeting is chiefly for the cherry, the walnut will receive no little attention.
