READY FOR BIG FOURTH

**Committees Are Busy and
Salem Will Have Greatest
Celebration in Its History**

The various committees which are planning for the Fourth of July celebration held a meeting yesterday evening, and reports were presented. Dr. T. O. Smith, who had charge of the Goddess of Liberty contest, reported \$315.25 had been received from that source. The Yew Park fire boys have decided to take part in the parade. The Woman's Club will do all in their power to assist in the decorating of floats. The comic parade, with its various features has aroused considerable interest on account of the prizes that have been offered, and the committee in charge believes it has in store one of the finest things the people of Salem have ever witnessed. In numbers the Salem celebration will be the largest ever attempted here. The country people are planning to attend, and the citizens from the neighboring towns will also be here.

The meeting was enthusiastic and the preparations that are being made has sent the members of the committees to their work with renewed energy and zeal.

Knights of St. John Conclave.

Buffalo, N. Y., June 25.—The city is handsomely decorated in honor of the thousands of members of the Catholic order of the Uniformed Knights of St. John, who are here to attend the national conclave and meeting of the supreme commandery of the order. From early this morning bodies of the brilliantly uniformed knights, accompanied by military bands, marched through the city to their respective headquarters and the streets were lined with thousands of people who greeted the marching knights with enthusiastic applause. The main streets, through which the parade of the knights will march this afternoon, are particularly attractive

with their profusion of flags and bunting and their graceful triumphal arches and the gaily decorated grandstand. There will be strong competition between the visiting lodges of the order to carry off the numerous valuable prize offered to the best looking, the largest, etc., lodges marching in the parade. Some of the uniforms are exceedingly rich and tasteful and the display will undoubtedly be unusually attractive. The order is the largest military Catholic organization and lodges from all parts of the United States will be represented in the parade. The conclave will last four days. The local knights have made extensive preparations for the event and have arranged an interesting program for the conclave.

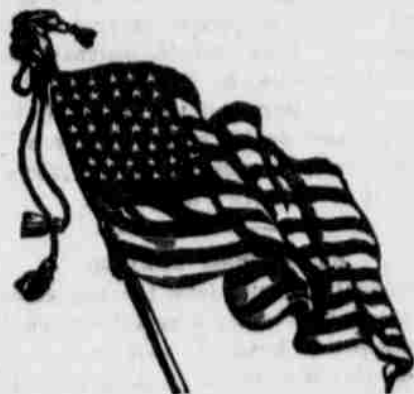
