SALEM BREAD WAR

Demand for Certain Brands May Build New Bakeries

The introduction of Butternut Bread at Salem has resulted in making quite a stir among the local bakeries. The bread has almost captured the community. Groceries cannot get orders for other bread, as the Butternut has been so well advertised in the newspapers. There has been a new malt bread put on the market that weighs about 15 ounces to the five cent loaf, while the Butternut averages 13 to 14 ounces. Another bakery firm is canvassing the city and suburbs for daily deliveries of a new variety of bread that they propose to put on the market. Quite a number of Salem bring rye bread, black bread, and pumpernickel bread home with them from Portland whenever they go to that city. They carry it in a hand satchel. The demand for bread with more crust and that is less spongy and more solid and substantial is quite strong. The crust is considered the nourishing part and better bread will have thicker crusts.

The Trial of Mitchell.

The trial of Mitchell at Seattle for the killing of Holy Roller Creffield began yesterday. Besides the regular venire of 90, Judge Frater issued a special venire for 60 talliesmen. It is thought the trial will last at least a month. The defense will plead that Mitchell was driven to temporary insanity, brought about by brooding on the wrongs done his sisters by Creffield. Thirty witnesses have been subpoenaed by the defense from Oregon, among the number Prosecuting Attorney Manning, of Multnomah county; Mitchell's sister, Mrs. Starr; Mrs. Creffield's father and a number of people from the Oregon towns which have felt the blight of Creffield's teachings will also be present as witnesses.

GETTING EXHIBIT READY

Jamestown Exposition Commissioners Are Already Beginning Work

When the state of Oregon goes into the exposition at Jamestown, Va., next year, it will not do so blindly. The commission that was recently appointed by Governor Chamberlain has organized by the election of Jefferson Myers president, and John H. Stevenson secretary, and has already begun its work. President Myers was in Salem yesterday afternoon and he said that some time before the meeting of the legislature the commissioners will go to Jamestown and look over the ground and review the situation. They will on their return make a report to Governor Chamberlain, who in turn will submit this report to the legislature. On this will no doubt in a large measure depend the size of the appropriation that will be made by the legislature.

Mr. Myers said that the commissioners would ascertain where they could erect the Oregon building in case it is decided to have one, what the lights, drayage, etc., will cost, and these estimates will have the signatures of the officers of the exposition. The commissioners will know on their return just what Oregon can get for her money.

The commissioners are at present in favor of the state making a good show. Jamestown is in ten hours' ride of 21,000,000 people and will no doubt be visited by an immense concourse, most of whom reside in the congested states in the east, where Oregon would be most likely to draw home-seekers.

It is a significant fact that Oregon is the first state in the west to take official action in regard to being represented at Jamestown. Washington is expected to follow in a short time.

A few hours after Governor Chamberlain appointed this commission, Governor Mead of Washington wrote to Hon. Jefferson Myers about it and asked: "What does this mean?"

In his reply, Mr. Myers said: "This means that Oregon is taking the lead among the states in the west."

When the Oregon people went to St. Louis they were compelled to pay \$24 a month for telephone service, \$2 per hundred pounds for ice, an exorbitant price for lights and so on. It is not proposed that the state shall be robbed at any more exhibitions and the commissioners will look into these things in advance.

BLODGETT TO HANG FRIDAY

Murdered a Variety Actress in Portland Because She Had Ceased to Love Him

The execution of George Blodgett, sentenced to be hanged by the district court of Multnomah county, will, in all probability occur at the state penitentiary Friday between the hours of noon and 1 o'clock. At any rate, he is sentenced to die at that time, and so far no effort has been made to appeal the case or procure a stay of execution. Blodgett killed a variety actress in a lodging house in Portland last fall, because the woman said she no longer loved him. Blodgett had previously deserted a worthy wife and had been philandering all over the country with the denizens of the footlights. The only redeeming feature in the whole unsavory business is the dog-like faithfulness of the deserted wife. She came on to Portland when her husband got into trouble, and has stood by him ever since.

It is said that Blodgett now says that his attorney, Charles L. Ford, of Portland, was given \$150 to get an appeal on the case. Judge George who was the trial judge, gave the defense until June 15th to prepare an appeal, but the time passed without any action being taken.

It is probably too late now, and Blodgett stands a pretty fair chance to expiate his crime at the end of a hempen string.

However, a report in the Telegram last evening shows that Attorney Lord has retired from the case, and another attorney has been appointed, who will ask a stay of proceedings, on the grounds that Blodgett has not had a fair deal, and it seems quite probable the stay will be granted, as even the district attorney seems to think no proper efforts were made to perfect an appeal. Blodgett asserted in court today that he had paid Lord \$150 to perfect the appeal, and that Lord had not even visited him in his cell. It is quite probable that the time of Blodgett's taking off, if he is taken off, is in the somewhat remote future.

CROP AND WEATHER BULLETIN

General Summary.

The rainfall during the week was very light, and ample sunshine prevailed, which caused much higher temperatures during the afternoons. The night's, however, continued cool and on Friday morning light frosts occurred in a number of exposed localities in the eastern and southern portions of the state. In the Willamette valley Sunday was the warmest day of the season, and temperatures of 90 degrees or more were general. In the coast counties foggy nights were common, which were usually followed by clear afternoons. East of the Cascade mountains the temperatures, although higher than the previous week, were slightly below the seasonal average. The prevailing winds were northwesterly and generally light, although on one or two days they were disagreeably high, without being in any way destructive.

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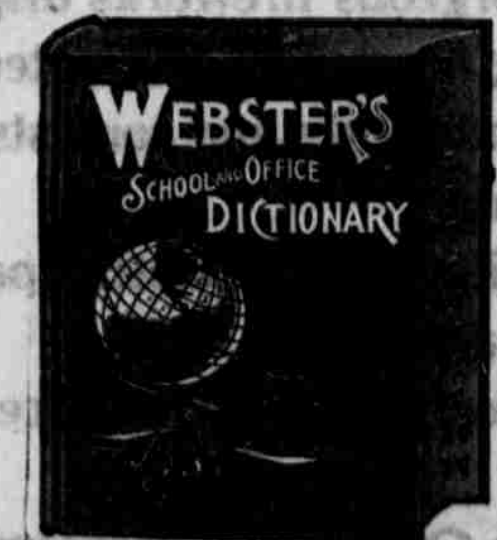
