OBEY THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE.

Indications are that the threatened hold-up of the legislature to defeat Jonathan Bourne for the United States senate will not materialize.

THOSE WHO DO NOT LIKE MR. BOURNE OR WHO HAVE SOMETHING TO GAIN PERSONALLY BY HIS DEFEAT MUST SEE THE DANGER IN SETTING ASIDE THE PRINCIPLE INVOLVED.

The defeat of the regular nominee and the regularly elected Republican candidate by the next legislature would carry some things with it.

It would not only be setting aside the law, but would be putting the Republican party on record as opposed to the popular election of senators.

If the friends of Senator Fulton in any manner assist in the defeat of Jonathan Bourne there will be a kick-back when Fulton asks re-election.

COULD OREGON HAVE A MORE ENERGETIC AND DEVOTED AND ABLE PAIR OF MEN IN THE SENATE THAN FULTON AND BOURNE—MEN IN THE PRIME OF THEIR LIVES?

Can Oregon do better than to keep these two men in their places in the senate, backed by the popular will, and growing in power and influence?

Can the Republican party do better than to stand pat for the direct plan of nomination and election of senators, as we have started in to do?

This is not a personal matter, a matter of who can get the federal offices, but a practical question of party policy for Republicans to consider. Do they want to make Oregon a permanently Democratic state?

ATTENTION, FRUIT GROWERS!

Do not overlook the great cherry competition to be held at the council chamber, in the city hall on July 6 and 7, under the auspices of the state horticultural society.

Nearly \$200 in valuable cups will be given away at that time for the best display of cherries and other fruits.

Enterprising business men of Salem have donated these cups. The state horticultural society has consented to meet with us at that time. It now only remains for the fruit growers of Salem and vicinity to come out, bring their fruit and compete for these premiums, to make this the most successful horticultural meeting that has ever been held in Oregon.

The state horticultural society and the business men of Salem have done their share, let those who have cherries, or other varieties of small fruit, preserve their best samples and exhibit them in competition at that time, so that visitors from a distance may carry away with them a good impression as to the possibilities of fruit growing in this section of the state.

While these cups are open to competition for fruit from any part of the state, it is expected that the people of Salem and the surrounding country will contribute the greater part of the display, and a concerted effort should be made to retain the largest number of these cups for this section of the state.

We should not allow Hood River, Eastern and Southern Oregon and other sections of the state to ship their fruit in from a distance and carry off these valuable cups.

Arrangements have been made with the Salem Brewery Association, so that persons having to pick their fruit a few days in advance can have it placed in cold storage and kept in good condition until the meeting.

Prepare now to save and collect the best samples of fruit for this exhibition and be sure to have same on hand early Friday morning, July 6.
