SALEM TO BE BUSY

Skidoo, The Fourth, Cherry Festival and Target Practice by Militia

The first ten days of July will be busy ones in Salem. The Elks' Skidoo, with all its carnival ring and noise, the great Fourth of July celebration, with all its outbursts of patriotism; the "Cherry Festival and Exhibit," and the annual rifle competition between the teams selected by the companies of the Oregon National Guard will make the Capital City an exceedingly busy city, and hundreds of visitors will be within her gates to attend these various meetings. Salem will do herself proud in the cordiality of the hospitality and entertainment she will extend to her visitors and guests during all these events of more than common interest. The cherry festival will bring fruit growers from different parts of this state, some of whom will then visit the city for the first time.

The shooting tournament, however, should receive more than passing notice from our people. The range which is being built on a piece of land recently leased in the west part of the city will be ready for practice about July 7th, and several of the soldiers will take advantage of this opportunity to put themselves in condition for the big day, when the closing events are pulled off, by arriving a few days in advance.

Special matches will also be held among the various companies while the men are encamped at Salem, and from the record of past performances keen competition will be expected.

The competition has been divided into three matches--the state trophy, the state medal and the state individual. Prizes will be given for the best scores, and these will consist of gold, silver and bronze medals.

Company M, of this city, now holds the state trophy, and is determined to keep it if possible. To that end the local marksmen are doing some efficient practice.

The national guardsmen will camp here July 9, 10 and 11. The teams will consist of four men and one substitute. One commissioned officer will be allowed on each team.

COAL OIL SMELLS GOOD

Judge Frazer of Multnomah County is not Afraid of Rockefeller's Money

Circuit Court Judge Arthur L. Frazer, who presides over the local Juvenile Court, this morning declared that he would accept for his jurisdiction any sum of money that John D. Rockefeller wished to give to aid the work of the juvenile courts throughout the nation. Because some persons may think that the millions of Rockefeller smell of oil does not convince Judge Frazer that this cash cannot be put to good uses.

Judge Ben Lindsey, of the Denver Juvenile Court, and America's leader in this work, is reported to have refused to accept \$5,000,000 which the oil king offered him with which to finance the National Juvenile Improvement Association. The offer, it was said, was made unconditionally. The Denver jurist is now reported to have decided that the millions are "tainted" and should not be used for juvenile court purposes.

"Just let Mr. Rockefeller offer to give me funds to promote the Juvenile Improvement Association and see how quickly I'll take it up," said Judge Frazer. "Even if an odor of Standard Oil is said to be on the money, I'll put it to good use so quickly that this odor will soon disappear."

"This money might be the means of doing the greatest good in the world for it could be used to educate thousands of bright American boys and girls who would otherwise be neglected. And who knows but that it might be used to educate some boy who would in after years drive all the trusts from the land and make the Standard Oil story nothing but a fairy tale?"

"I could use any sum that any millionaire wished to give, and if Mr. Rockefeller should see fit to make me trustee of his proposed gift, I would begin to distribute it within an hour."

Hence, in time there will be eases and ale once more in the land of Korea.

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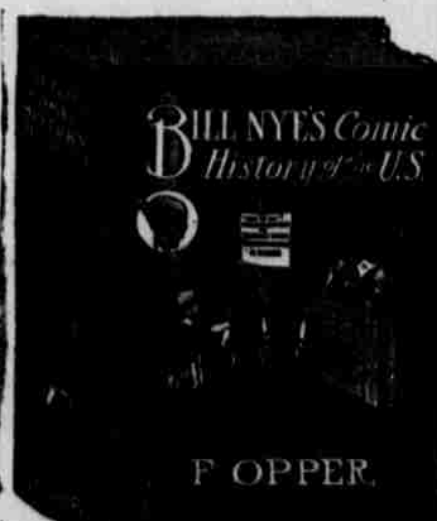
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Bill Nye's Comic History of the United States
