STATE
FAIR

W. H. Downing Visiting Valley Points to Stir up Enthusiasm for State Fair

W. H. Downing, president of the state board of agriculture, left this morning on a trip through the Willamette valley counties in the interest of the state fair. He will visit Benton county, and will spend sometime in Corvallis, working up enthusiasm among the people, who have in the past been very enthusiastic for the fair.

"Benton county has always had a fine exhibit, but somehow we have not as yet heard what they intend to do this year. I will then continue my journey to McMinnville, and see what 'Old Yamhill' will do for us," said Mr. Downing. Washington county, which always is represented at the fair, and has in the past been among the prize-winners, will also be visited. Mr. Downing will stop at Forest Grove and confer with Austin Buxton, the prominent farmer and president of the State Grange, and urge him to use his best efforts to have that organization do some earnest boosting for the fair and the exhibits from the various counties.

At Hillsboro Mr. Downing will meet the county officials and present the claims of the state fair and urge them to prepare an exhibit worthy of that great agricultural and dairy country.

"But what we would like to see most," said he, "is a deep interest taken by the people of Portland in this year's fair. We laid down last year that they might get the best results possible from the exposition, and we hope they will reciprocate this year by attending the state fair in large crowds. We've never had good crowds from Portland, nothing like we should have had, and this year we want to stir up the Portland people to a realization of what the state fair means to them and the whole state."

It is the plans of the state fair officials to secure better transportation facilities, and if possible to bring pressure upon the railroads to run more excursion trains during fair week.

State News

A telephone line from Junction to Eugene has been established.

Thomas Bell, an agent soldier and resident of Goshum, died Sunday at that place.

The new Methodist church at Locust Grove, near Arlington, will be dedicated July 8th.

The Springfield baseball team defeated the Silverton team by a score of 23 to 4 Sunday.

The Willamette Baptist Association opened at Portland yesterday in its fifty-eighth session.

The Iron Dyke mine in the Seven Devils country near Baker City has been sold for \$809,000.

Portland's schools closed last night, and in consequence there are 14,000 happy youngsters in Portland today.

Great crowds are attending the Turner meetings, it being the most successful gathering the Christian church has ever held in the state.

The race meeting at Independence begins Saturday, and promises to be an interesting event. Many horses from surrounding towns will be on the track.

Prod Wheeler, of Ontario, was drowned in the Snake river Monday. He was engaged in building a bridge over the Nehalem river, but was in swimming at the time.

James Beavers, the young man found in Dead canyon, near La Grande, in an unconscious condition, has regained consciousness after 36 hours of oblivion. He was hurt by being thrown from a horse.

Howard L. Hoff was instantly killed Monday in a logging camp near Marshfield. The donkey engine was hauling in a log, when one end of it struck a tree, and the other end swung around, catching Hoff and crushing him to death.

Walter Sofer, a youth 16 years of age, was found dead in the mountains 25 miles east of Roseburg Saturday afternoon. There was a bullet hole in the abdomen, and it was evident he had shot himself accidentally. The body was buried at a ranch near where he was found as it was impossible to get it out over the rough mountain trail.
