EASTERNERS
CARRY
THE GUNS

New York, June 19.

When Bat Masterson came here from the West to be deputy United States marshal, he said: "more men carry revolvers in New York, in proportion to the population, than in any Western town in which I ever lived."

The police say that one man out of every five carries a revolver, and in some parts of the city the ratio is even higher.

Skeptical persons can have no better proof of the truth of these assertions than is contained in the record of the events of almost any day. Scarcely a day passes, that an argument, and assault or an alarm of some kind does not collect a crowd and in the crowd can always be found enough pistols to put Deadwood to shame.

And do not think that New Yorkers carry revolvers merely for the sake of carrying them, for on the slightest provocation they draw them and commence to shoot.

Only a few days ago, a negro, arrested by a policeman, broke away and ran up Broadway. A passenger just alighting from a car drew a revolver and began shooting at the fugitive. A man in an automobile drew a revolver and fired a few more shots; a man standing in front of a hotel joined in the bombardment and the negro, for his own protection stopped and allowed the policeman, who alone had refrained from shooting, to recapture him.

Members of a wedding party in Eldredge street drank too much. A fight started and in the twinkling of an eye four revolvers were flourishing in the little room.

A policeman is authority for the statement that every other Italian carries a revolver and some of them two.

Two small boys, one thirteen and the other fourteen years of age, nearly caused a riot in Brooklyn one day last winter by drawing revolvers and shooting at the school house because one of their companions had been kept in.

Detective-Sergeant Dominick Henry of police headquarters was on his way early one morning last winter. Two men and two women on their way home from an evening of pleasure were directly ahead of him. Suddenly an argument started and one of the young women drew a revolver. Detective Henry was quick enough to prevent trouble and the young woman was arrested.

This custom of carrying revolvers has steadily grown in New York despite more and more stringent laws to prevent it. At one time more than three thousand permits to carry revolvers were in force in the city. The reckless use of them, however, became so common that all but about four hundred of those permits were revoked.

But although the police made frequent arrests for the violation of the ordinance forbidding the carrying of deadly weapons, the \$10 fine was not sufficient to impress the offenders. It was changed to a short term in prison and now it is a fine of \$250 and six months in prison. But notwithstanding that the habit continues to spread.

The very lowest estimate made by the police places the number of revolvers sold daily at something more than one hundred, and of that number about one-fifth go to women.

How many of the handsomely dressed and daintily looking women who wander daily through the department stores carry little pearl-mounted revolvers in their spacious shopping bags is hard to say, but that has often been proved.

The cost of revolvers carried in New York ranges from \$1 to \$250. Some of the little short-barreled, pearl-handled revolvers carried by women are set with jewels and inlaid with gold and silver. They are of little practical use.

At the time of the riot between the rival factions of Chinese, a search was made of all the Chinamen found on the streets and in the houses of Chinatown, and every one carried a revolver. More recently a search of Italians was made and out of every fifteen searched fourteen carried weapons.

To secure permission from the police to carry a revolver, it is necessary to make a formal application to the captain of the precinct in which you live. The reasons you give must be good and must await a thorough investigation before he approves of your request. If he does, and he usually does not, your request is sent to the inspector of police and a second investigation is made. If he, too, approves your request is sent to the commissioner of police and you receive your permit.

Of those holding permits at present the greater number of men who are daily forced to protect property of value that renders them liable to attack, drivers of mail and express wagons and watchmen. Very few private

individuals now have them, though several presidents and cashiers of large banks do.

Revolvers they are called in the store but the men who carry them daily and in defiance of the law have dozens of other names for them. The members of the Paul Kelley gang might know what you meant if you spoke of a revolver, but they would know far more quickly if you called it a cannon, barrel cracker, Fourth of July, wowski canister or kicker.

Pennsylvania Democratic Convention.

Harrisburg, Pa., June 27.—Probably never before in the history of the state has the political situation been more complicated and uncertain as just now. It is doubtful whether the Democratic state convention, which met here this forenoon, will simplify matters and bring more clearness in the political situation. Three state tickets have already been named in this state, and, if the convention, which is now in session here, should decide to put up a separate ticket of its own, there will be four, and great confusion in the ranks of both principal parties in the bargain.

The Prohibitionists named a ticket on the supposition that the Democrats would endorse it, and placed State Treasurer William H. Barry at the head of it. The Lincoln Republicans, the so-called reform wing of the party, put up a ticket headed by Lewis Emery, Jr., a veteran fighter against the Standard Oil company. The regular, or so-called machine Republicans, of whom Senator Penrose is the leader, have nominated a ticket headed by Edwin S. Stuart, former mayor of Philadelphia.

During the last few weeks various efforts were made to start a movement in favor of a fusion. The Prohibition branch of the Democrats urged the endorsement of Berry by the regular Democratic convention, while the reform element favored the endorsement of the Lincoln party candidate for governor. It seems, however, that a considerable part of the Democratic party does not favor fusion with any other party, but insists upon the nomination of a straight Democratic ticket. Col. Guffy, the leader of the party in this state, made many efforts to restore peace and harmony among the various factions, with a view of inducing them to agree upon a candidate to head the straight Democratic ticket at the coming campaign. His efforts were futile, however, and when the convention was called together this forenoon, the situation was practically unchanged, and the party apparently as far from a compromise as ever.

Former Mayor Vance McCormick of Harrisburg is strongly pushed for the gubernatorial nomination and is considered one of the strongest candidates whom the Democrats could place at the head of their ticket. But it remains to be seen whether the convention will see fit to bury the hatchet and accept McCormick as compromise candidate. It is considered practically out of the question that either Barry or Emery will be endorsed. Should the Democrats nominate McCormick, State Treasurer Barry will withdraw from the race and will not permit his name to head the Prohibition ticket.

No Sham Battle This Year.

Washington, June 27.—A general order will be issued from the war department in a few days giving instructions in regard to the exercises of the mobilization of troops in the summer at Mount Gretna and the other six camps of concentration. It has been decided to hold no sham battles and to indulge in nothing of a spectacular nature. The work of the troops, both regular and militia, will be confined to practical operations and exercises which tend to harden soldiers to out-of-door life and train them for the hardships and exposures of field work. There will be abundant marches and night bivouacs away from the regular camps. There may be at each of the camps a final review, which will be attended, as far as possible, by distinguished officers. It is possible that General Bell, chief of staff, will visit all of the camps some time in their existence, provided he can leave his work in Washington. This may not be possible for any length of time, since his assistant, Gen. H. T. Barry, will, a part of the time, be absent in Europe, where he goes with other officers, including Gen. P. W. Duval, to witness the German army maneuvers.

Arrangements have also been made for a representative of the general staff at each of the camps for the purpose of technical observation of the work of the troops. The officers who have charge of the camps, such as Gen. Grant at Mount Gretna, where the New York militia will be sent, are enjoined to see to it that there is the least

possible amount of a soldiers' show and that everything be done to give the camps a serious and businesslike aspect.
