HOPS HERE AND ABROAD

Markets Are Lifeless and Prices Low English Crop Unpromising

The local market remains in lifeless condition and no important transactions reported, although we hear of occasional inquiries by brewers, without resulting in much business. On the coast we hear of some sales in Sonoma county, California, at 7¢ for fair brewing grades. The New York state price markets remain firm although old grade lots could be bought at 5¢ and better hops at 8¢. Crop reports generally continue favorable especially from California where estimates are now as high as 100,000 bales for the coming crop. There are some reports of vermin in Oregon and Washington but it is not generally thought to amount to much. New York state still reports cold weather and hail storms which have retarded the growth somewhat. The yields are reported to be uneven, most of them being rather backward and thin, though some are in excellent condition. There are reports of vermin both in England and on the Continent, though most advisers claim the English crop to be coming along nicely.

Hop Conditions in England.

Kentish Observer, June 7: From our special reports it is seen that the bine is generally backward, and that the aphid fly is present in most places. We asked our correspondents to state in these preliminary reports whether the acreage in their parishes had been reduced since last season; in some instances the reply is in the affirmative, but the grubbing does not appear to have been very extensive. Last year's crop, which was officially estimated at 695,943 cwts., was grown on an acreage returned at 48,967.

Kent.

Ashford.—The hops in this parish have started very well on the whole, although they are very uneven in places, and some are very backward. Flea has been very troublesome in some gardens. The hops want warmer weather and less wet, which is causing some to go a bit yellow, especially in the Puggles. Lice and fly are to be found in abundance. Cultivation very fair. Average reduced since last season a bit.

Canterbury.—Helped by the rains and the warmer temperature last week the young bine made good progress but is still backward and the cold nights this week have retarded growth. Fly has made its appearance in most of the grounds.

Essex (East).

Northam.—The bines are very backward for June, and now a severe attack of fly has appeared, as many as 127 on a small leaf have been seen. Perhaps this may prove a blessing to the growers in the end. The acreage has been slightly reduced, but in a neighboring parish several acres have been planted.

South Worcester.

Hops are very backward and uneven for the time of the year. The frosty nights and hail have done considerable damage to the bine, but with warm days and nights it is possible for the hop bine to recover yet.

Waterville Market.

The hop yards are still reported in a favorable condition about here, many of the yards showing a strong, healthy growth that promises an excellent crop. Others do not look as well but will give a fair yield if nothing unfortunate occurs between now and picking time. As yet there is no complaint about lice which are giving growers on the coast and in England some anxiety.

New York Market.

New York Journal and Bulletin, June 22.—Conditions in the local market were about the same as yesterday. Demand was not active although there was some inquiry from brewers. Prices were nominally unchanged. There were further reports of damage by lice on the coast and in Europe. Advice from up-state indicates satisfactory progress in the growing vines.

In discussing the situation in Portland some days ago Mr. Gilbertson said:

"I think there is every reason to believe that before the new crop comes on hops will be selling again as high

as they were in the latter part of April. There never was a July nor August without an Eastern demand. The brewers are holding off now because they think there are more hops in the country than really exist. They will see their mistake before long and then when they want hops where will they get them?

As for the new crop market it looks as if the best prices will prevail at the first of the season. If the present conditions continue and nothing happens to the European crop there will surely be a surplus grown and prices will suffer. This business of raising a surplus year after year is beginning to tell on the market. It is my candid opinion that the next few years will be bad ones for the growers.

Another thing that is going to hurt the industry in Oregon is the growing prohibition sentiment. It has taken a firm hold on many of the growers and counties that owe most of their prosperity to hop growing have voted themselves 'dry.' The eastern brewers will not put up with this long and it would not surprise me to see them declare a boycott at any time against Oregon hops."

Notes

The Oconto Herald of June 14 says: The hop market in Oconto is dull—practically nothing doing. New yards are looking well but some of the old ones rusted badly. In northern Oconto the hail last week did considerable damage, and some yards which have been ruined have been plowed up and sowed to buckwheat.

The Cooperstown Farmer of June 15 says: There is very little business doing at this center. Occasionally a small lot changes hands, but that is the extent of the transactions. The heavy hail storms of last week severely damaged some yards in this county, but fortunately the path of the storm was not wide. Considerable damage is reported from Oneida and Madison counties.

The Cobleskill Index of June 14 says: Reports continue to come in telling of the poor condition of the old yards. Many of them have been practically ruined by the effects of the hard winter. The new yards are looking thrifty and clean, being free from vermin. It is yet too early to forecast the coming crop, but it is safe to predict it will not equal that of last year.
