DOES NOT PASS BY SALEM

Fifteen Thousand Appropriated for Completing Work on Postoffice Building

(Four O'Clock Edition.)

Washington, June 28.—The senate committee on public buildings reported a number of changes in the house bill, including new appropriations for Baker City, Oregon, \$65,000; Eugene, Or., \$50,000; Reno, Nev., \$40,000; Ogden, Utah, \$120,000; Salem, Or., \$15,000; Provo, Utah, \$80,000; Lewiston, Idaho, site, \$50,000. Other appropriations were reduced to the following amounts: Moscow, Idaho, \$70,000; Spokane, Wash., \$75,000; Tacoma, Wash., \$75,000; Great Falls, Mont., \$150,000; Missoula, Mont., site, \$10,000; Bellingham, Wash., site, \$10,000; North Yakima, Wash., site, \$10,000.

Tillamook is to have a county fair, beginning probably August 23d, and lasting three days.

A rich strike has been made in the Blue Bird mine, which adjoins the famous Red Boy, in Grant county.

Two large buildings were burned at St. Johns at early hour this morning. They were Halborg's furniture store and the undertaking establishment of Zeller, Byrnes & Blackburn.

Fire broke out in the House warehouse at McMinnville Wednesday afternoon, and nearly the whole block was destroyed. The warehouse was filled with baled hay, and the loss will total \$10,000.

Six buildings, costing a total of about \$6000, which are to be the home and headquarters of the reclamation department during the construction of the East Umatilla irrigation project, are now being finished at Hermiston.

RIGHTS OF THE INSURED

Attorney-General Crawford, in a written answer to a series of questions propounded to him by Secretary of State Dunbar, regarding the bankruptcy of insurance companies and the appointment of receivers gave as his opinion that the insolvency terminates the policy of the companies at once.

In regard to a policy holder suffering loss by fire after the insolvency of the company has been declared, but who had no notice of this insolvency, the attorney-general says:

"As to whether a claimant who suffered damage or loss after the date the company was declared bankrupt or insolvent would have a valid claim on the company's deposit with the state treasurer, I am of the opinion it would depend largely upon how soon after the company was declared bankrupt the loss occurred. While that would be considered the date upon which a settlement should be made of all business of the company transacted within the state, still if no proceedings were had with the state of Oregon and no actual notice of the company's insolvency received and nothing done which could be held as constructive notice of the same, I am of the opinion that a court of equity in settling up the business of the company would allow the policy holder to recover his loss from the fund but if such a length of time had transpired after the company was declared a bankrupt or such legal or other proceedings had that the policy holder could be considered negligent in not reinsuring in some other company, then I think a court of equity would probably reject his claim. Those matters are largely within the discretion of the court settling up the company's affairs, and a person claiming must himself have been diligent."

Sues for Damages.

Dan McCann has begun a suit against Casper Zorn in department No. 1 of the circuit court. The plaintiff demands judgment against the defendant for \$400 special damages and \$5000 general damages. It seems that the plaintiff was wrongfully charged with stealing ten sheep, valued at \$40, the property of John Hofer and the defendant, Casper Zorn, but that the grand jury did not find a true bill against plaintiff. By reason of unfounded criminal prosecution, the plaintiff asks for damages.
