Pentecostal Mission.

The members of the congregation of the Pentecostal Mission have built a neat church on Fifteenth and Mill streets. Rev. W. N. McCandish is the pastor, and has begun his work under most favorable circumstances. The interior of the church is not entirely finished, but the members hope to be able soon to improve it. "There has been many reports circulated about our church that are entirely untrue," said a prominent member to a Journal reporter this morning. "We are not Holy Rollers. Our aim is to make our church a home for the poorer people of our city, who do not feel like attending the downtown Methodist, Baptist or Presbyterian churches of the city. 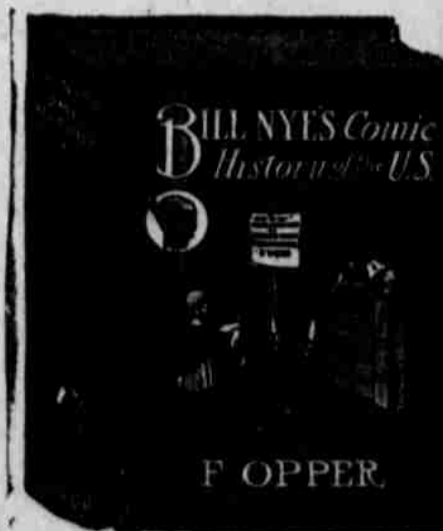
