## Cannery Is Busy.

The Royal Ann cherries that are coming into the Mutual Canning Company's place are of the finest quality ever grown in the state. That means that there have never been any better cherries grown. The rain yesterday will injure the crop to some extent, and if it continues several days will cause the cherry growers of Marion county to lose thousands of dollars.

The season for canning strawberries is almost over, and only a few small lots are now coming to the cannery. The Logan berries are coming in rapidly, and if the rains do not continue too long the crop will be immense. Of course, it is understood that the market for these delicious berries has to be created, but no difficulty is expected in disposing of the comparatively small amount that will be placed on the market by the Salem cannery.

After the season of cherries is over the cannery will probably be occupied for a while in canning tomatoes, and in future seasons this branch of the industry will be an important factor.

Washington, June 29.—Typewriter firms which sell machines of the visible writing variety, have had an interesting contest in the war department, to ascertain which is the best machine for the signal corps. The signal corps will buy something like 500 of the machines eventually. It has been decided to limit the contest to the class of typewriters mentioned, and there were five firms which presented their claims. One of the companies sent here a young woman supposed to be the fastest writer on the machine in the country. She amazed the government operators by the speed with which she rattled off the sentences given to her. On one occasion, when familiar material was dictated, she achieved 250 words a minute. She was able to write on the machine and correct as she went along as rapidly as a person could read to her distinctly.
