VALLEY TRAVEL NOTES

Sidelight on Oregon Personalities and Oregon Politics

Eugene, June 28.—(Special.)—A run up the Willamette valley the latter part of June is a treat for any man of esthetic tendencies. The rich verdure in the valleys and on the hills can not be equalled by any exhibition of greenness on God's universe.

Such towns as Turner, Marion and Jefferson are strung like pearls, shimmering white in waves of green foliage, and then Albany is worn on the breast of the valley like a great big old-fashioned brooch on the green tulle gown of a country bride.

As the evening train rushes up the valley a delicate blue mist comes over the mountains on each side of the valley, until their crests are lost in the inverted dome of translucent atmosphere. The wreaths of vapor begin to creep up out of the canyons and the cool air of night settles over the valley.

Eugene is bright and busy always during commencement week. Whether the town is Alma Mater to the university or vice versa is hard to say. They fit one another well, and no one has ever suggested that there was any other place in Oregon as fit for the university as the classic little city at the forks of the Willamette.

I met Hon. Walter Griffin, the hardware man, who is one of a committee on co-operative or mutual insurance. If the insurance managers do not look a little out those keen business men will help themselves to insurance on business blocks and stocks of goods as cheaply as the McMinnville company has done for residence property.

It is almost pathetic to think of Albany and Eugene going "dry." Many a commercial traveler rushes over to the little restaurant at Albany and snatches the last ham sandwich and beer and the mustard never tasted as good as it does now that the place is to be closed forever. The grass will grow high all around the depot grounds and drummers will not charge the house 50 cents for a 15-cent lunch.

I met old Father Driver. He was on the train, going to his ranch near Largent, where he lives with his wife and three daughters. He has developed into a respectable agriculturist and has come down into Democratic Linn to spend the mature years of his clerical career. Father Driver is a vicious old-fashioned Republican and was onto the unfortunate Democratic politician who gets a toss of his horns. I don't think Grover Cleveland would enjoy meeting him so long as sheep and wool are at the present fancy figures. How the Republican politicians could have mismanaged so as to lose the governorship of this state as successfully as they have passes comprehension. There are to be still further encroachments of holy-roller politics and combinations of Socialism and Prohibition pained off on Oregon in the name of Democracy.

I always go to see Judge Kincaid for old times' sake. He and Mr. Pitcock of Portland are the pioneer editors of the state. He has cleaned up a small fortune out of Portland real estate and spends a great deal of time in that city. I rejoice in the old man's good luck because he always had a streak of liberality about him, and never was noted for being close. That such an open-handed man can succeed is gratifying in an age of graft and greed. It was also a pleasure to learn that his son Webster is running a thousand-acre ranch near Eugene. The young man, who is an only child, and has generous parents and is subjected to a lot of higher education who comes out useful and practical and has common sense about business, is almost a miracle in these days. Webster Kincaid rides a broncho, wears rough clothes, looks the picture of health and prides himself on his well-cultivated orchards and is building up a model ranch.

Judge and Mrs. Fenton were at the college commencement and were very proud of their son Horace's achievements in biology. On his record in medical science he has been admitted to Johns Hopkins, and he has a great future in the profession of medicine. Another son, Ralph Fenton, has just been graduated from the medical school of Northwestern university, Chicago, and has taken a position in the Ear and Eye Infirmary of the Illinois Central railroad. Mr. Fenton has dedicated two other sons to the legal profession. Contrary to general expectation, Judge Fenton will not have anything to do with politics for some time. In about six years he hopes to clean up a number of business ventures and when his four sons are all settled in business he proposes to give some of his time to the state. As a native son, a tiller of the soil, one of the builders of Portland and a maker of greater Oregon, he has an undoubted right to recognition, and his great abilities as a lawyer and public speaker will secure him prominence wherever he sees fit to assert himself.

Dave Dunne, the collector of internal revenue, seems to have a cinch on his place for another term. His chief deputy, Shinn, will go out July 1, on account of failing health. Patterson as collector of customs asks no further consideration in that office. His chief deputy, Pike, has a fine record as a custom house man, and will be almost indispensable to whoever gets the appointment. Patterson had his eagle eye on the United States senatorship, but now concedes that a man by the name of Bourne stands a better chance. He will probably return to Salem and look after his large stock farm and hop yard interests, where he is also said to be slated for the presidency of a Capital city bank.

It is not believed that Mr. Shelly of Lane county can land the collectorship. Owing to the bank examinership going to Salem, it is doubtful whether any Salem man can get the collectorship. The talk of F. I. Dunbar becoming collector of customs after he gets through being secretary of state is groundless. Mr. Dunbar says he has had his share of politics and is said to be wanted for the presidency of a large insurance company. The collectorship will go to a Portland man or State Chairman Westgate of Albany. Appraiser of stores, which is held by General Summers, is said to be the greatest sinecure in the way of a federal office in Oregon, paying \$3000 a year, with virtually nothing to do but draw the salary.
