STEVENS ELECTED SHERIFF.

On the account of votes Stevens wins out for sheriff of Multnomah county by 25 plurality.

This probably ends the struggle for the office of high sheriff of the largest county in the state.

There are still to be indictments for election frauds, such as false counting, swearing in illegal votes, etc.

But such things are common to a large city and in a close contest, and may not affect Stevens' claim to the office.

That the election laws are very defective is plain to every one. The door appears to be purposely left open for frauds.
