SKIDOO OPENS TONIGHT

There Will be Music, Lights, Laughter and Fun--Go and Forget Your Troubles

Even the weather bureau smiles on the Elks' Skidoo. Everything combines to make the grand opening to-night a big success, and the boys have everything in readiness for the big show. The corner of Commercial and State streets tonight will be in a blaze of glory, and it is expected that the attendance will be immense. The Spanish-American Concert Company, Del Hogo's Mexican orchestra and the Rose City quartet, consisting of 12 people, have arrived in the city from Portland, and will open the show to-night. There are five Mexicans and seven others in the aggregation, and they are reputed to be good entertainers.

The different attractions in the Skidoo are difficult to describe. Those who are curious should attend. "The Country Store," "The Kangaroo Court," "The Rat Cellar," "The Chamber of Mystery," "The High Diving Pool" and a score of side attractions will furnish a big variety of amusement.

New Officers Monday.

There will be a few changes at the court house next Monday. The recently elected county officials will be sworn in and assume the duties of their respective offices. There will not be many changes. County Clerk John W. Roland will retire and R. D. Allen, county clerk-elect, will preside over the destinies of that office. Mr. Roland and his competent assistants have given entire satisfaction to the patrons of the office and step out with the good will of all. L. P. Aldrich, of Silverton, will be Mr. Allen's first deputy.

County Recorder Siegmund, who has made one of the best and most affable recorders the county ever had, will also turn over the office to his successor, D. G. Drager. For the present, at least, there will be no changes among the deputies of that office, so Mr. Drager stated to a Journal representative.

Next Week at the Edison.

Special arrangements are being made for next week's play at the Edison theater. The play is entitled "For the Red, White and Blue." It is a strong military play overflowing with patriotic spirit, thrilling situations and comedy. It would be a hard matter to find a more suitable play for Fourth of July week. "The Bohemians," which has made such a favorable impression this week, will be played for the last time tomorrow night.

Marion Probate Court.

In the matter of the estate of Theodore Hiss, the appraisers, who were D. W. Ryer, Joseph Baumgartner and F. N. Derby, have filed their report, and have estimated the value of the estate to be \$6574.78.

Wayne Baker, W. H. Dalrymple and Owen C. Baker, the appraisers of the estate of the late B. F. Bonham, have fixed the value of the estate at \$3415.95, real property \$2950, and personal property \$465.95.

The Governor Will Speak.

Governor Chamberlain will be one of the speakers at the union picnic on Government Island at the Lewis and Clark fair grounds in Portland, July Fourth. The affair is for the benefit of Catholic charities, and promises to be largely attended. The governor will speak on "The Day We Celebrate."

Judgment for Plaintiff.

In the case of Margaret Beck against Louis Beifus and wife, the jury brought in a verdict for \$21.25, the amount alleged due by the defendant to the plaintiff for house rent. The cause came up before Justice H. H. Turner.

Dues on a Board Bill.

WILL BUILD ROAD

Portland and Southern Railroad Securing Right of way Through Marion County

If the guess of Hon. John B. Ryan, secretary of the Democratic state central committee, on electric railroads hits the mark with the same accuracy as his prognostications on gubernatorial elections, trolley cars will be gliding over the mesa between this city and Portland ere many moons wax and wane.

Besides being secretary of the state Democratic central committee, Mr. Ryan is a lawyer. He is the chief attorney for the Portland & Southern Railway company, which purposes to build a line from Portland south through Salem, that will run parallel to the Southern Pacific road, keeping on the east side of the Willamette river all the way up.

"The difference between this road and the other proposed road is, this one will be built," said Mr. Ryan, this morning.

The business of the Portland attorney in the city is to complete the work of obtaining the right of way through the lands in Marion county. It is understood that the rights of way have already been obtained, but Mr. Ryan is completing the work and getting the contracts in legal form. He will be in Salem most of the time for ten days or two weeks.

Attorney Ryan is very confident that the road will be constructed and thinks that there will be very little delay in beginning the work of construction.

This company has already made arrangements with the Oregon Water Power & Railway company, that maintains an electric line from Portland to Canemah, a mile south of Oregon City to use its tracks, and that will save sixteen miles of the distance and will obviate the necessity, trouble and expense of obtaining a franchise to use the streets of Portland; and will at the same time save the many months that will be required in constructing the sixteen miles that are already built. It is only thirty-seven miles from Salem to Canemah and the proposed route is one over which it is easy to make a grade and lay tracks. The most difficult part of the route is that where the river is already done.

If the work is commenced at once and is pushed with any degree of energy, there is no reason why cars may not be running from Salem to Portland before next year's violets bloom.

Painting Them White.

Some people like to paint things red and some things look good when smeared with red, but Fire Chief Savage is busy today painting the fire hydrants white. There are about 75 of these fire hydrants in the city, and all will receive a coat of paint. It is a step in the right direction and a much needed improvement. The hydrants were covered with rust, and were not a credit to the city.

In Circuit Court.

Mrs. Elsie Losckke has commenced action in Judge Galloway's court for divorce against August Losckke. The divorce was granted at Columbus, Nebraska, July 30, 1880. The plaintiff alleges harsh and cruel treatment from her husband as to make life with him a burden, and that she has been compelled to live separate from him.

Grading for a New Church.

A crew is making the dirt fly on the premises where the new Christian church is to be erected. Several teams are busy hauling away the dirt, and much progress is being made with the excavations.

President Signing Bills.

Washington, June 30.—At 11:35 the President went to the capitol to sign bills during the last hour of the session. He entered the President's room in the rear of the senate chamber, and at once began turning bills into laws.

STATE NEWS

Canby will celebrate the Fourth of July.

A great building era is going on at Medford.

Miss Nellie McMullen has been chosen goddess of liberty for the Fourth of July celebration at Pendleton.

Mrs. Doreen Bolds, mother of Harvey E. Cross, secretary of the Willamette Valley Chautauque Association, died of heart failure at her home in Canby Friday, aged 73 years.

Fifty men and women were caught in a fire trap at the corner of Fourth and Yamhill streets in Portland early yesterday morning. For a time it looked as though the Goodnough building was doomed, and the Oregon Journal put out of business. Only hard work on the part of the fire department got the fire under control. Those caught in the lodging house escaped in their night clothes.

Cecil Goodwill, a 14-year-old boy of Marshfield, lost his life Friday, having been overcome by the fumes of gasoline on a schooner. The boy with his chum, Elton Metlin, were on board and went into the toilet, and after some time were missed by the others. A search was made and they were found lying unconscious. A small leak was found in the exhaust pipe which ran through that room. The Goodwill boy never regained consciousness, and it is feared the other will die.

BURBANK'S PHENOMENON.

A New Berry That Bids Fair to Become a Great Favorite.

George W. Weeks, who owns a farm on the river bottom two miles north of Salem, brought to The Journal office this morning a box of the new berry, a cross between the Outhbert raspberry and the improved California dewberry, known as the "Burbank Phenomenon." The berry is large, a deep red, slightly tart and of fine flavor. Mr. Weeks has five acres planted, and, while the baby vines this year produce only a sample, next year he expects to have at least 200 crates. They resemble the Logan berry in appearance, but are devoid of "whiskers." Its solidity and rich color will make it a favorite for canning and with the jelly makers, and it will, no doubt, soon become one of the standards.

To Preserve Piling.

Seven carloads of piling from the timbered districts in the neighborhood of Marion passed through the city yesterday for Wyeth, a station seven miles east of the Cascade Locks on the O. R. & N., where they will be erected and consigned to eastern states.
