MADE FALSE COIN

Gang of Nine Counterfeiters Arrested Who Had Their Plant Near Pendleton

Nine men who have operated one of the most successful counterfeiting plants ever known in the Northwest are now under arrest in Huntington and vicinity. The counterfeiting plant was located on the Bastin ranch, five miles below Huntington on the Snake river, and was in charge of A. R. Coon and Joe Hansen. A. R. Coon has been a resident of Huntington for 20 years and six years ago was sent to the penitentiary for counterfeiting, but his plant was not located. Hansen is also an ex-convict and together these men located and constructed the plant.

The money made by the counterfeiters was all in \$5 and \$10 gold pieces and was shipped out to the larger cities for distribution. The Portland agent for the counterfeiters was J. H. Williams, a noted counterfeiter, who served a term in Sing Sing for the crime several years ago.
