REPUBLICANS BEING DECEIVED.

The born, bred and raised grafter, who can see nothing to Republicanism or Democracy but a chance to pull at the public coat, naturally hates any check or curb on his game or conception of politics. He instinctively hates direct legislation.

Republicans are being deceived, misled and put out of touch with public sentiment by the ceaseless clamor of such papers as the Salem Statesman.

one in the house, the smallest number in that body for many years. Of the 30 members of the senate 14 are holdovers, and of the 16 elected this year, seven signed statement No. 1. Two pledged to vote for the Republican candidate having the largest vote.

HONEST MEN TURN FROM TODAY.

Direct election of senators is putting the power back in the hands of the people, where it was stolen by the trusts, oil kings, steel barons and multimillionaires generally, AND THE STATESMAN OBJECTS TO THE PEOPLE ELECTING SENATORS.

Of course, the people will stand a great deal from the newspapers. Many Republicans can be deceived. The party can be misrepresented by putting it on the defensive and it can on the line advocated by the Statesman BE PERMANENTLY RETIRED FROM BUSINESS IN OREGON.

The people of Oregon have been patient and long-suffering in Oregon with the short-comings of their public officials. They have not murmured at high taxes, at indifference to progress and at jobbery of all kinds.

But if Republican leaders are going to follow in the teachings of the Statesman, and IF THE PARTY ATTEMPTS TO UNDO ALL THAT THE PEOPLE HAVE UNDERTAKEN BY DIRECT LEGISLATIVE METHODS, THE STATE WILL GO DEMOCRATIC.

Furthermore, if the next legislature undertakes to submit reforms that have met with the approval of the people, we need not be surprised if the people take the referendum on the legislature itself and seek to abolish it.

LEGISLATIVE GRAFT.

It is a fact well known to all that from the beginning to the end of the legislative session it is but one continued round of graft. It is graft from every possible standpoint and at every time.

Trade, combinations, schemes are hinges upon graft. From every point of the compass comes these propositions, and almost one-half the measures proposed have back of them some hidden sting of graft. There are the usual promises to uproot these evils and some new members go to the capital fully convinced that he will be the Moses to lead his people out of their moral bondage to the high plain of rectitude.

One of these temporary vapors has arisen in the person of Representative-elect Coffey, and of him the Telegram says:

(Roseburg Statesman.) "Representative Coffey is to be congratulated on his determination to do his utmost to uproot the petty grafts which have disgraced every session of the legislature. The ridiculously large stationery bills for the use of the members, the perquisites in the form of stationery, pen-knives, fine paper-cutters, scissors and other plunder of this description has been carried to such a ridiculous length as to make it shameful in the eyes of every decent beholder. Men who in their private capacity would not for a moment tolerate such courses, much less mix up in them, not only permit but participate in them in their legislative capacity, and help to set an example and exercise a bad moral influence on the whole state. Far too many clerks are employed. On one pretext or another they draw pay from the state without pretense of performing any service. Political hacks, men with a pull of one kind or another, seek to Salem every session, confident that they will receive, easy employment at remunerative pay during the forty days the lawmakers are at work, and they are rarely disappointed.

Indeed, the time has come when the members of the legislature look this matter squarely in the face and put it on a practical basis, such as it would be forced to occupy were the matter of private instead of public concern.

Reform is the order of the day at Washington; why should it not be at Salem?

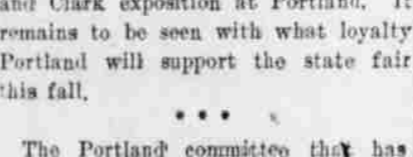
