PRODUCTIVE VALLEY OF WILLAMETTE

Storehouse of Pacific Northwest Will Be This Fall a Land Literally Flowing With Milk and Honey

Hay and hops; hops and hay.

Never before has the great Willamette valley, the granary and storehouse of the Pacific Northwest, promised larger productions of these two Willamette valley staples. The oldest inhabitant, the chief clerk of the weather bureau, the goose bone, and old Rain-in-the-Face, from the Warm Springs agency—all these best weather prognosticators agree that the summer now is here and the gentle rains will patter no more on the shingles till the bleak November comes.

This insures enormous yields of hops and hay.

Clover and some of the other earlier grasses are ready for cutting and a considerable quantity has already been mowed. The two or three damp days last week caught some of this on the ground in an uncured state, but the damage done to it was insignificant.

The remainder of the hay crop, the great bulk of it, is now ready for the mowing machine and there is no probability that anything will occur to prevent the yield from being the largest that the valley has ever known.

It is the same with the hop crop. As has already been stated in these columns, the hop acreage is large this year, notwithstanding low prices prevailed last season. Such a large amount of capital is invested in the hop industry in the country tributary to Salem that one or two bad years in prices will not lessen the acreage. The hop yards, almost without exception, look remarkably well. The late and wet spring seemed to be just what the doctor ordered for the rapid growth of hops, and the warm weather and glad sunshine put in an appearance just in time to prevent the lice from coming and to give new impetus to the growth of the vines. In all the valley country where hops do best, the growers are busy in their yards. Most of the fields will have to have one more cultivation and another training. The dry weather began just in the right time to favor this. In nearly all the yards, the growers have been cleaning up their grounds and the work of harvesting the crop will be done easier and quicker this fall than usual.

Indications point to the flattering prophecy that this year will be a banner one in wheat raising in the Willamette valley. The acreage is large and so far the prospects are good. The wet weather went out of business in time to prevent the aphids from making a visit to the wheat fields and there has been no rust reported yet. It is not likely that there will be any, as the warm weather and sunshine will begin to get in their work.

Cherries and Logan berries are now in their zenith. The early varieties of cherries and the strawberries are practically all gone, but the Logan berries and raspberries are now at their best and the crop is large. The Royal Anne cherry—rightly named—was never better in quality, but in most localities the yield was small. The local demand for this splendid variety is good and people are finding it difficult to obtain enough of them to can for home use. A considerable quantity, however, is being brought in to the Salem Mutual Cannery and the prices that prevail are good. There need never be any doubt that cherry growing in the Willamette valley will pay.

The demand for small fruits and berries this year and the steady prices that were given by the cannery and the dealers will stimulate the farmers to go into this branch of agriculture more extensively in the future.

In the Liberty neighborhood the prune crop promises well. The trees are loaded and the fruit is of fair size and it is apparent that the dryers will be taxed to their full capacity.

At the Riverside farm, seven miles north of this city, the hops are looking well and the yield promises to be fully as good as last year. The vines have been trimmed and the cultivating is over with.

Oats and wheat are growing fine and the yield promises to be large unless unforeseen circumstances retard the growth of the plants.

From the Spring valley neighborhood, seven miles from Salem, comes the same glowing report of heavy crops and splendid yields. Corn in that section is a little backward on ac-

count of the rain of the past few weeks, but the garden truck is thriving and there is an abundance of it. Wheat and oats are growing splendidly. An examination of the wheat fields of that locality shows that the aphids have done no damage whatever and no trace of the pest can be found. Here the hops are growing fast and look better than they ever did at the same time during any previous years. The training of the vines is about finished.

J. R. Chapman, who lives a few miles northwest of the city, states that the gooseberry crop was splendid and that one of his neighbors cleared \$237 from one and a fourth acres of gooseberries. The Logans in that locality are growing well and one of the largest yields in years is anticipated. The market, too, for that kind of berry is good and many farmers will experiment in setting out plants in the fall. The Logan berry is not very well known as yet, but promises in due time to become the predominating berry of this section of the Willamette valley. The strawberry season is practically over, but the farmers are pleased with the excellent yield and quality of this year's crop.
