Young Women's Conference.

East Northfield, Mass., July 5.—The Young Women's conference, which opened here today and will remain in session for ten days, is attracting great interest and promises to be the most successful conference of the kind ever held. Several hundred delegates are in attendance, and represent several schools, young women's societies of churches, girls' clubs in cities, towns and villages, etc., in all parts of New England and the Middle Atlantic states.

Among the delegates are some representing the Misses Masters' school at Dobbs Ferry; Mrs. Dorr's school, at Briar Cliff Manor; Walnut Hill school, at Northfield, Mass.; Northfield Clubs at Troy and Brooklyn, N. Y.; Woodland Avenue Presbyterian church, Philadelphia; University Place Presbyterian church, New York; Young Women's Christian Association of Springfield, Mass., and various other clubs and institutions in Ridgefield, N. J., Hartford, Conn., Rochester, Whitehall, White Plains, N. Y., Wilmington, Del., and other cities.

This is one of the youngest of the six district conventions which are held here during the summer, but the attendance is remarkably large.
