Will Soon Be Laws.

Governor Chamberlain is preparing a proclamation, which will be issued next week, declaring the laws in force which were enacted by vote of the people at the June election. These bills will be in force from the date of the proclamation.

There are seven of these laws as follows:

Providing method for amending the constitution by applying the referendum to all laws affecting constitutional provisions and amendments.

Giving cities and towns exclusive power to make and amend charters.

To allow the state printer's salary to be regulated by law at any time.

For initiative and referendum on local, special and municipal laws and parts of laws.

To compel sleeping car companies and other common carriers to pay an annual license on their floor cars.

To regulate express, telephone and telegraph companies to pay an annual license on their gross earnings.

The law to prohibit free power and discrimination by railroads was carried by a majority vote at the polls, but it has been declared void owing to an error in the law, inasmuch as it failed to secure an existing clause required by the constitution.

RUSSIAN SOLDIERS MUTINY

Many Killed in Vladivostok Mob Captures Battery and Fires on Loyal Troops

Vladivostok, Siberia, July 5.—Morning soldiers have been rioting in the streets since Saturday. There was fierce fighting and many were killed. The mob captured a battery of artillery and turned the guns on the loyal troops.

Acted Too Late.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—In order to stop the disorders among the troops Grand Duke Nicholas, upon the order of the czar, dismissed General Ozeroff and Gaden, and relieved from duty Prince Vasilevich, commander of the guard corps. Gaden is a descendant of an American named Gordon. It is expected that all attempts to purge the army of the spirit of disloyalty will prove futile.

Bojarsky Pleads Guilty.

Cronstadt, July 5.—In a manly effort to save the surviving members of his staff and the other officers, who he believed surrendered the gubnet Redout on account of affliction for their wounded commander and their desire to save his life, Admiral Bojarsky yesterday pleaded guilty before a court martial. In a short speech to the court the admiral declared that he took all the blame on his own shoulders, and asked that he alone be punished to the fullest extent of the law, virtually an appeal for condemnation and death, which is the penalty for hauling down the stars and cross to a hostile vessel. All the defendants, including Captain de Colonne, chief of Admiral Bojarsky's staff, and Captain Baranoff, commander of the Redout, pleaded not guilty. The taking of testimony will take several days.

Bristol Is Reappointed.

Chicago, July 5.—The Tribune publishes today its annual summary of deaths and injuries caused throughout the United States by the celebration of the Declaration of Independence. The figures up to an early hour today were, dead 18, injured 2718.

Adopt Standard Measures.

Seattle, Wash., July 5.—The 25 percent increase on Washington insurance rates, made to reimburse the reserve funds depleted by the San Francisco fire, went into effect today. There was a big howl. Sawmills, dwelling houses and public buildings are not affected.

Plumbers Threaten City.

Trondheim, Norway, July 5.—The Wellman-Christie expedition sailed from here this morning for its headquarters in Spitzbergen.

Want to Be Cared.

H. O. Meyer, William Wann and R. E. Walker, composing the harbor's commission for the state, made a report to the governor today. The report shows that the receipts of the commission from October 31, 1905, to May 31, 1906, were \$1925, and the expenditures for the same time were \$1244, leaving cash on hand the amount of \$681.

The commission reported that it had just made a trip through Eastern Oregon, and found in many towns in that part of the state young delinquents who had diplomas from so-called barber schools but were in no way qualified to ply their trade. The commission was compelled to stop there from work.

The commission expresses the hope that the next legislature will so change the law that the commission will have absolute control of all the barber business in the state.

LIVELY DAY AT PENDLETON.

Bronco Rustling, Stabbing Affray and Heat Are Its Features.

Pendleton, Or., July 5.—With the thermometer at 108 in the shade and the crowds so dense that it was difficult to pass along the sidewalks, Pendleton enjoyed the most successful Fourth of July celebration in her history. The bronco-busting was the feature of the day, some of the riding being the best ever seen in this part of the country. One of the horses was a king of snakes, and the man who finally rode him, a half-breed Indian, was given a purse of \$100. One Indian was severely injured by being kicked five times by the same horse.

A fight with knives between Tom Scott, edited, and an unknown white man was the only unpleasant incident of the day. Both men were badly cut and were bleeding profusely when the police stopped them. It is not thought that the injuries of either will prove fatal.

DOCK SINKS INTO THE LAKE.

Crowd Watching Fireworks Is Thrown Into the Water.

Omaha, July 5.—Nearly 100 persons were precipitated into about 16 feet of water at Lake Manawa, a pleasure resort on the Iowa side of the Missouri river, by the collapse of a landing dock at 10:40 last night. Lena Rosenbloom was unconscious when taken out and afterwards died. A Miss Chamberlain is thought to be fatally injured internally.

There was a display of fireworks on the water and bathing by electric lights when this dock suddenly sank into the lake. All the victims live at Omaha.

Forten, Colo., July 5.—Andrew Bolden, a merchant, today shot his partner, John Degasper, in the head; Peter Gomes in the shoulder, and killed J. M. Loeven. He escaped, but a mob is pursuing him.
