VIOLATES ITS OWN LAWS

Government Imports Con- tract Laborer to Fashion Uniforms for Soldiers

Washington, July 6.—George U. Winslow, the British expert military tailor, who was brought here to cut clothes for the American soldiers, says the Yankee soldier is the best formed and smartest appearing in the world. He specifically states that he is less "body" than the Briton, and more active, and more buoyant in carriage than the German, French or other European.

Submarine Makes Long Run.

New York, July 6.—After a run of 325 miles at sea under her own power, the submarine torpedo boat Lake, which arrived here the other day, has continued its journey to Bridgeport, Conn. The feat of the Lake in sailing the high seas alone from Newport News to New York is said to be unparalleled. Propelled by her gasoline engines she came through from Newport News without the slightest mishap in forty-four hours. Capt. Evans' log says that several vessels were passed during the cruise and their occupants looked down with great curiosity at the lonesome little speck on the waters. The Lake carries a crew of eight men. The craft is eighty-five feet long and is the largest submarine ever built in this country. Electric engines provide power when the boat is traveling beneath the surface.

Americans Too Busy to Come.

London, July 6.—It seems that there will be no American delegates representing the United States senate and

the house of representatives in attendance at the fourteenth congress of the interparliamentary union, which will open here on July 23. Invitations were sent to every member of the senate and house of representatives several weeks ago, but up to the present time no acceptance have as yet been received. It is feared that the American senators and congressmen will be too busy with the elections to attend the congress in this city. All the parliaments, including that of Russia, will be represented. One of the chief subjects for discussion will be the proposals for a general or partial disarmament.

The British government has given \$25,000 toward the expenses of the congress and has placed the Royal gallery, adjoining the house of lords, at the disposal of the delegates. The British group, composed of 300 members of parliament, is arranging for elaborate entertainments, including receptions by King Edward at Windsor castle and the lord mayor at the Mansion house, and a great dinner and entertainment at the Crystal palace.

Confessed on the Gallows. (Four O'Clock Edition.)

Wilmington, N. C., July 6.—For the murder of Captain Ruml, the steward, mate and engineer of the schooner Carry Berwind, off the Carolina coast, last October, Harry Scott, a Baltimore negro, was hanged here this morning. He confessed, exonerating the two negroes condemned to die as his accomplices. It is probable the President will pardon them.

Judge Tanner Pardoned.

Portland, Or., July 6.—Judge A. W. Tanner, law partner of the late Senator Mitchell, upon whose testimony Mitchell was convicted of land frauds, was pardoned today by the President. He had pleaded guilty to perjury before the grand jury, but was never sentenced.

ALTON FOUND GUILTY

Agents Faithorn and Fred A. Wann Cinched. But the Big Fish all Leak Out

Chicago, July 6.—Federal Judge Landis this morning sustained the first eight counts of the indictment charging the Alton railroad, its agents, John N. Faithorn and Fred A. Wann, with giving rebates to Switzschil & Sulzberger, packers, and declaring the payment of a dollar truckage fees for every car taken over the S. & S. tracks was clearly a rebate, in violation of the alien's law. The jury was instructed to find accordingly. He declared the last two counts, regarding the repayment of passenger fares, faulty, and ordered them dismissed.

The jury found Faithorn, Wann and the Alton railroad guilty, according to the instructions of the court. Notice for a new trial will be argued tomorrow.

Princess Victoria's Birthday.

London, July 6.—Princess Victoria Alexandra, the only unmarried daughter of King Edward, is celebrating her thirty-eighth birthday today. She was born at Marlborough house on July 6, 1868, and is only one year and four months older than her sister Maude, now the queen of Norway. For some years there were rumors of a probable marriage of the princess, but the princess did not seem inclined to give up her independence and now every hope of her marriage has practically been abandoned. She has an independent income of her own and seems determined to live and die as she expressed it, "the old maid daughter of a king."

Will Interest Art Lovers.

Rome, July 6.—Art lovers throughout the world will be pleased to learn that in the near future they will be able to inspect one of the finest art collections ever formed. This collection has never seen the light of day since Pope Leo X., that mighty patron of art and learning, got it together. That was some four hundred years ago. Since then the collection, known as the Sancta Sanctorum, has been shut away in the chapel of the Santa Sancta. It contains specimens of ecclesiastical vestments that go right back to the very beginnings of the Christian church. There is goldsmiths' work wrought by the greatest mediaeval masters of the craft. Illuminated manuscripts, ancient enameled pictures by artists unknown to moderns, glorious things that were amongst the treasures of the old emperors—all are there. Professor Grisar, a Jesuit and a great archaeologist, has obtained permission to overhaul the collection, photograph it and write a book on it. Later, probably, it will be arranged for the public to view it. Then Rome will have added yet another attraction to the many she possesses for the world at large.

Stone Mountain Baptists Meet.

Decatur, Ga., July 6.—The Stone Mountain Baptist Sunday School convention will open here this evening at the Decatur Baptist church. It will open with a song service, followed by several addresses. W. J. Northon will speak on "The Sunday School and Citizenship," and B. W. Spilman on "The Modern Sunday School Movement." The convention will close with a religious service on Sunday evening. Judging from the large number of delegates who have already arrived here, the attendance will be quite large. An interesting program has been prepared and many prominent speakers will deliver addresses before the convention.

Good "Nigger" Now.

Lexington, Ky., July 6.—James Pearl, a negro, was hanged here this morning in the presence of several hundred for criminal assault. He attempted to assault three women within an hour. Twice he was frightened away, and the third time shot R. L. Jones, an old man, attacked his wife, and left both unconscious.

Schooner Sunk.

Norfolk, July 6.—The schooner Magis Phelps, en route to the Bahamas for a cargo of pine apples, is lost with her crew of six.

Bully for Krock.

Fairbanks, Alaska, July 6.—H. G. Krock has bought mine No. 10 below Cleary for \$175,000.

WILL ACQUIT MITCHELL

Jury Is Powerfully Affected by the Stories of Hart- ley and Baldwin

Seattle, July 5.—It is generally believed here that the jury is prepared at this moment to acquit Mitchell. Close observation of the jurors during the court session reveals that the frequent arguments of the state over minor legal technicalities is irritating to them. Several have acquired the habit of looking absently out of the window when these frequent and lengthy objections of the prosecution are interposed.

Today's session was taken up largely by witness from Oregon. The most important of these was Baldwin and Hartley. Mr. Hartley was put on the stand late in the afternoon. He told of Creffield's influence over his wife and daughter, and of his efforts to kill the fanatical viper. His testimony was confined to the period after Creffield's release from prison, when the prophet was organizing a Holy Roller settlement on the coast.

He stated that the Holy Roller's influence over his daughter, Miss Mildred Hartley, 23 years of age, was such that she gave up going to school. She was then in the Agricultural College at Corvallis, and in her fourth year. Creffield told her that unless she left off school God would smite her.

Started Out to Kill Him.

"When the Holy Rollers started by train for their camp on the coast," said Mr. Hartley, "I learned what they intended doing, and managed to catch the same train. When they learned I was aboard the train they tried to get me off. Finally they got off themselves. To get back they had to walk 65 miles. I remained on the train."

"My object, gentlemen, to be frank with you, was to kill Creffield. He had ruined my family, and I intended to take his life."

"I followed the Creffield party to Newport. Having no gun with me, I went to a conch-hand store and bought a cheap weapon. By mistake or trickery, I don't know which, the dealer sold me a center-fire revolver and rifle-cartridges. When the party took a boat to cross this bay to South Beach I drew a bead on Creffield. Had my cartridges been all right that would have ended the matter. The gun snapped, and Creffield got away. The Rollers then thought Creffield was protected by God, and that he could not be killed."

Lays in Wait for Quarry.

"The next day I followed them to camp. This time I had a Winchester, which would do the work. I laid in wait for Creffield for three days, but he never came in sight. I saw all his followers, but he had evidently gotten away. Later, when I met Mitchell also hunting for Creffield to kill him, I told him how I had missed the Roller. He did not seem surprised or displeased."

"He said the reason I had failed was because God had left it for him to kill Creffield. He seemed utterly out of his mind."

Mr. Baldwin's story was not less dramatic in its details. He was placed on the stand late in the afternoon, and completed his statement during the afternoon. He is the father of four daughters, but only one of them came under Creffield's power. He said, however, that he soon put a stop to it all by forcibly compelling the girl to remain away from the Holy Roller aggregation. She was so completely under Creffield's influence that she attempted to leave home, packing her clothes for that purpose.

"She was then in a broken-down condition, and I decided to protect her from further folly, even if I had to remove her from the earth," the witness said. "When I met Mitchell at Corvallis he told me that God had commissioned him to kill Creffield. I told him he was crazy to talk that way, and tried to reason him out of his plan. I told him that I wanted to kill Creffield, that he was a young man with his life before him, while I was old and able to bear the consequences. He would not hear of my plan, though, insisting it was for him to remove the man by God's command."

Demanding Baldwin's Daughter.

Mr. Baldwin, in conclusion, said Creffield once said him word that God

would smite him unless he gave up his daughter to the Holy Rollers. He also added that the girl assumed the Holy Roller garb, a thin wrapper.

W. T. Gardner, of Portland, superintendent of the home of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, testified regarding the confinement of Miss Esther Mitchell to that institution. She was sent there because of her Holy Roller practices. George Mitchell, her brother, came to him one day and said Creffield was planning to abduct the girl from the home. He asked that special care be taken of her.

Later, Frank Hurt, one of Creffield's followers, was seen hanging about the society's grounds. Witness said he was informed that Creffield had selected Esther to be the mother of a new Savior who was to be sent into the world by God, and that it was for this reason he had attempted to secure her release.

Mary J. Graham, matron of the society, gave similar testimony. She said Esther was incorrigible in her Holy Roller practices, insisting upon rolling on the floor and praying until late in the night. Witness feared to have the girl about, fearing that she might be seized with a hallucination that God had commanded her to kill some of the children or keepers. Witness also added that Mrs. Starr was also detailed by Creffield to abduct Esther, but was prevented from accomplishing that end.

NO STAR UNTIL JULY 1, 1907.

Oklahoma's Place Will Be in Blue Field, at Lower Right Hand Corner.

Washington, July 6.—After consultation between Quartermaster-General Humphreys and Admiral Cowles, the chief of the equipment bureau of the navy department, the two officers who are charged with the making and issuing of the national flag to the army and navy, respectively, it has been decided that the admission into the Union of the state of Oklahoma shall be recorded by the addition of a star in the blue field of the flag placed at the lower right hand corner. But as several things remain to be done before the new state is actually admitted, and as the law provides that the additional star shall only be set in the field at the beginning of the next fiscal year after the state is one in fact, the Oklahoma star will not be seen on the ensign until July 1, 1907, and therefore the salutes which have been given are premature.

Quaint Quaker Marriage.

London, July 6.—The village of Yealand Conyere, in North Lancashire, was the other day the scene of a wedding solemnized according to the simple ritual or usage of the Society of Friends. The bride was Miss Gwendoline Priestman, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Priestman, of Bradford, and the bridegroom, Mr. Allan Claude Rowntree, eldest son of Mr. Allen Rowntree of Scarborough. The meeting house, where the marriage was solemnized, is nearly two hundred years old.

There were no hymns and no officiating minister. After a short meditation the bridegroom and the bride rose and the former said: "Friends, in the love of God, I take this, my friend, Gwendoline Priestman, to be my wife, promising through divine assistance to be unto her a loving and faithful husband until it shall please the Lord by death to separate us." The bride made a similar declaration. A certificate embodying these declarations was read by the contracting parties and witnessed by those present.

Atwood Runs a Bluff.

(Four O'clock Edition.)

San Francisco, July 6.—H. F. Atwood, of New York, chairman of the underwriters' adjustment bureau, in an interview this morning, declared that "unless the business men and big banking institutions of San Francisco woke up and met the insurance companies fairly, this country is going to be swept by a financial cataclysm. The insurance situation," he said, "is bad," but refused to say if any failures were imminent. He declared he wasn't accusing the financial institutions of being responsible for delays in the insurance settlements, but reiterated that they must wake up.

Anarchist Arrested.

Berlin, July 6.—An anarchist named Rosenberg, who is believed to have come in connection with a conspiracy to assassinate the Kaiser, was arrested today upon his arrival from America.

Both houses of congress of Bolivia, South America, have voted for liberty of religious worship.

DOUMA ATTACK CZAR

Troops Muting, and all Russia Is a Seething Caldron of Rebellion

St. Petersburg, July 6.—With freedom, venom and bitterness the deputies attacked the government in the Douma today, during the discussion of the Bialostock massacre. Deputy Jacobson cited the appalling list of outrages against a defenseless people committed by soldiers, and declared it was upon the orders of the Czar. The government's apparent appeal for order was really an insidious incitement to bloodshed. This was a text for other speakers, and created an immense impression throughout the city. People, accustomed to speak of such things in the greatest fear, are discussing it freely, and congratulating themselves that their delegates don't fear the Czar.

MORE ABOUT THAW

Her Mother Went With Her.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 6.—Mrs. Holman, mother of Evelyn Nesbitt, denies she ever introduced her daughter to White, or any theatrical person. She always accompanied her, because the girl was determined to go on the stage, and she would not permit her to go alone.

John Burns, night chauffeur for White, declares that least twice since her marriage Evelyn Nesbitt rode in White's automobile, once alone and once with other women. He told of the meetings between the two at other times, and said Evelyn called White "Stannie." Garvin says if Evelyn made an affidavit before her marriage it is destroyed, because there is no record of it now.

Burns said White always rode alone in the electric hansom, except when he took his wife or son, or some of his club friends; that he never drove White to Madison Square in company with any woman. He declared White was a good living man, with too kind a heart. A man whose possessions were always at the disposal of any one in apparent trouble. He always loaned his hansom to women at the theatres in bad weather, but never accompanied them.

Who Will Guarantee it?

London, July 6.—An insurance company has been organized, and it has a capital of \$1,000,000, and guarantees the face value of American life insurance company policies, for a premium of two shillings per £100.

Bryan Took a Flea.

London, July 6.—Bryan dined today with Major Bacon, the American military attaché. He met Secretary of War Harkness, Paul Morton, D. O. Mills and other Americans in the evening, and was entertained by Minister Reid.
