STOPPED
RUN OF
SALMON

Dam on John Day. Ought to Make the Fish Warden Look for Sawdust

According to reports from those who have been to the site of the big John Day river dam near Spray that self-same dam was a veritable death trap to the myriad of salmon trying to reach the headwaters of the many tributaries of the John Day river. There was a sheer lift of 14 feet. Against this the fish dashed in vain for freedom and fresh water in which to deposit their eggs. The water hurled the brave denizens of the sea back with relentless fury, and there they lay stunned and gasping for breath until picked up by some greedy fisher. But some may not get away, and that may not be tolerated. A huge rack was made and placed where the fish, hurled from the top to the dam would fall into it, thus securing them beyond hazard of loss. It is said that a deputy game warden was sent to the scene and ordered the ladder installed. About that time a freshet washed away one section of the dam, and it is supposed that a few fish found their way to the upper streams. Local fishermen now know why there has been no run of salmon, and but little of trout.—Prineville News.

North American Turner Bund.

Newark, N. J., July 6.—The biennial convention of the North American Turner Bund opened here today and will continue until July 11. About 250 delegates, representing all the Turner societies in the United States, are in attendance. The delegates are instructed in physical and ethical education and other thinking men from the various societies. The principal work of the convention will be the adoption of a declaration of principles for the gov-

ernment of the Turnerbund societies throughout the United States.

Among the demands which this Turnerbund will make in its declaration will be: Direct election of United States senators by the people; enactment of legislation through the initiative and referendum; the increase of efficiency of the public schools on the lines of a better system of instruction, eliminating from them all show and display, and providing compulsory education for children between the ages of 7 and 14 years; the creation of a uniform system of elections in all the states and the adoption of the Australian ballot; laws to protect labor from misuse at the hands of capital, and prohibiting labor by children under 14 years of age; a universal scheme that

will abolish all wars and substitute arbitration.

Suggestions in connection with taxation and religion will be of considerable importance. It is understood that a demand will be made for an inheritance tax, and also that no family shall be taxed on money or property that is necessary to pay its actual living expenses. The declaration will oppose interference with any religion by the state, or the enactment of any laws favoring any particular religion or religions. It will also oppose the exemption of church property from taxation and will declare strongly against the enforcement of a "Puritan Sabbath."
