Traces of Prehistoric Race.

Berlin, July 5.—At the last meeting of the Academy of Sciences in this city some interesting details were given of the success attained by the Russian Exploration Expedition to Chinese Turkestan.

A letter was read from Professor Gruenwald, dated "Kumura, near Kucha," stating that the Mingo Caves had been explored, but that the expected find of manuscripts had proved insignificant, the Japanese having carried most of them away in 1903. Most interesting archeological discoveries, however, were made.

Remains were found of persons belonging to a red-haired, blue-eyed race, evidently the founders of the Mingo Caves, and bearing garments of unmistakably Iranian origin. A number of huge iron swords were also discovered. Search revealed the existence of further numerous Buddhist frescoes containing many figures. The temple seemed, in fact, to have been a sort of Buddhist Pantheon.

New York Bankers Meet.

Bluff Point, N. Y., July 5.—The annual convention of the New York State Bankers' association opened here today at the Hotel Champlain. Alfred H. Curtis, the state president of the association, called the convention to order and delivered his annual address. The convention will remain in session two days and many prominent speakers will deliver addresses, among them F. A. Vandenberg of New York, S. R. Flynn of Chicago and H. E. Pollock of Fort Madison, Wis. This evening the annual banquet will take place at the Hotel Champlain, while tomorrow evening there will be an open air concert. The grounds of the hotel will be brilliantly illuminated. After the adjournment of the convention many of the delegates will take a trip to Lake Placid and a visit to Anseble Chateau.

Danger to Greenwich Observatory.

London, July 5.—At the last meeting of the council of the Royal Astronomical Society the following resolution was unanimously agreed to: "That the council learn with deep concern of the danger threatened to the Royal Observatory, Greenwich, from the erection of a large electric generating plant near the observatory, and desire to represent to the admiralty at the earliest opportunity their conviction of the paramount importance of maintaining the integrity and efficiency of Greenwich observatory, which has been

adopted as the reference point for the whole world." It was further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the first lord of the admiralty.

Reopening San Francisco Saloons.

San Francisco, July 5.—The saloons of this city which survived the earthquake and fire and were kept closed ever since by order of Mayor Schmittz with a view of preventing drunkenness and disturbances in the stricken city, were reopened today. They were kept closed yesterday, as it was not considered safe to allow them to be open during the excitement which usually accompanies the celebration of the Fourth of July. The police authorities have the situation well in hand and there were no serious disturbances today, although the saloons were patronized quite liberally.

HYDE PORTRAITS A NUISANCE.

Costly Relics of Equitable Family Bother New Insurance Officers.

Paul Morton, president of the Equitable Life Assurance society, has a white elephant on his hands in the shape of several thousand handsomely framed photographs of James Hazen Hyde, Henry B. Hyde, James W. Alexander and William H. McInyre. The photographs are very large, being practically life-size reproductions of the heads and shoulders of the former officers of the company.

They were made during the dizzy Hyde regime, when the policy-holders' money received scant consideration, and they were shipped to all parts of the world to ornament the office walls of the army of agents.

It was expected in the old days that every officer and department head of the company should have the finely framed photographs hanging on the walls of his office, and they all lived up to the unwritten law religiously. They are still hanging on the walls of innumerable offices in the Equitable building, as, in the absence of orders, nobody has had the temerity to remove them. The same holds true of the multitude of agencies all over the world. In the supply department of the Equitable there are stacks of the photographs boxed and ready for shipment. They have been there for more than a year. Each photograph, mat, glass and frame, represents an outlay of \$12, and the total cost to the policy-holders of the vanity of the former officers was in excess of \$30,000.

Owing to the disclosures concerning the Hydes, agents of the company think it best business to keep their photographs so much in evidence.

Another delicate problem of the same sort which President Morton has postponed dealing with concerns the big bronze statue of Henry B. Hyde in the main corridor of the Equitable. He has been advised to have it removed as a matter of business expediency.
