FRUIT SHARPS GATHER

A Magnificent Display of Cherries Delights the Eyes of the Fruit Growers

Never did the stage of the Grand Opera House look prettier and more attractive than it does today. It is a mass of fragrant flowers and beautiful blossoms, and the air is as sweet as a garden of old-fashioned roses. Then there are the decorated tables upon which are the cherries, the best and finest, and most luscious ever produced in the state of Oregon. From all the great fruit producing districts of Oregon cherries have been sent, and are now on exhibition. There are exhibits from Multnomah, Polk, Yamhill, and Marion. It is unnecessary to say that the judges will have a difficult task of making the awards for the specimens of cherries placed on exhibition are all of a splendid quality, size and flavor.

The varieties entered for competition are the Lamberts, the Bings, Royal Anne, Black Republicans, Hoskins and Deacons, and all these varieties together with the cups offered by the business firms of the city are on exhibition.

Among the prominent horticulturists in attendance are: P. A. Ratcliff, of Morningville, who has a fine exhibit of Logan berries and Phenomenon berries; E. S. Lutgen, of Mt. Angel, has some fine specimens of Bing and Royal Anne; Mrs. Prizell, residing south of this city, exhibits Royal Anne and Seedlings; Mr. Van Dorn, of Dayton, the apple grower, is here; D. Woodward, of Hood River, has an exhibit of Black Republicans; Miss Webb, of the Troutdale farm, has an exhibit exclusively of Lamberts.

L. D. Moulton, fruit commissioner for Yamhill county, who runs the Gal-lowsby orchard, is here accompanied by Mrs. Moulton.

Wm. Webb, of Marion, has also entered the competition.

UNDER WATER AGAIN

California Has Highest Water Since White Men Settled on the Coast

(Four O'clock Edition.)
Stockton, Cal., July 6.—All rivers are alarmingly high. At Orwood this morning the river was four inches higher than ever before in the history of California. It is believed Victoria and the middle division of Union islands are doomed.

NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

Driving Party Overwhelmed by Waves Near Yaquina Head.

Newport, Or., July 6.—A driving party last evening narrowly escaped death in the ocean, one of their horses being drowned. The party was composed of G. Mason and H. Stimpson, of Harrisburg; Miss Anna Baker, of Turner, and Miss Alma Cannon, of Myrtle Creek. Mason was driving. They were returning from a trip to the Yaquina Head light station, and attempted to drive around a point known as Jump-off-Joe. Mason was not familiar with the beach, and the tide was at half rise making it impossible to pass that way, which is dangerous even at low water.

He drove into water so deep that the horses lost their footing, fell down and became entangled in the harness. One of the animals was drowned. The occupants of the hack were thrown out, but clung to the vehicle. The accident, fortunately, was witnessed by Paul Chatterton and others, who hurried to the scene and reached it in time to rescue the party from drowning. They also got one horse out by cutting away the harness. It was nearly drowned, and had to be hauled out with another team and a line. The rescuers had to work in water up to their shoulders.

TEARS EYES FROM SOCKET.

Baker City Lad Blown Up by Gas-Pipe Bomb.

Baker City, Or., July 6.—A belated celebration of the Fourth may cost Dan Dillabaugh, aged 10, the sight of both eyes. He attempted to fire an improvised cannon last evening, touching a match to a rusty pipe filled with powder. The explosion carried away his entire right cheek, tearing the eye from its socket.

FORAGE FOR THEIR SUPPLIES

Mob of Fifty Women Raid the Commissary and Fire Newspaper Photographer Down Stairs

San Francisco, July 6.—A mob of 50 women refugees, angered by the slowness of the delivery of supplies, this morning descended upon the Moulter school, where relief flour is stored, seized a 25-pound sack apiece and made their escape, after throwing a newspaper photographer, who attempted to take a snap shot of the mob, down the steps.

Slow With Their War Reports.

Washington, July 6.—The literature on the war between Russia and Japan is not so promptly accessible as had been hoped by service people. The navy department has published one volume, the report of Surgeon W. C. Bailest, U. S. N., as the result of that officer's observations with the Japanese forces, mostly at the base hospitals.

The next report to come out will probably be that of another naval surgeon, Dr. Raymond Spear, now atached to the United States ship Baltimore, who was with the Russian army in Manchuria, and who had unusual opportunities of observation. His report deals largely with transportation matters, and will be copiously illustrated. The army officers' reports are still in process of editing and are not likely to be ready for distribution for some time.

Patton Valley Mill Burned.

Forest Grove, Or., July 6.—The saw mill owned by John Callahan, located three miles west of Gaston, in Patton valley, was completely destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon about 4 o'clock. The loss totals about \$6000, the mill being valued at \$4000, and lumber destroyed being worth \$2000. There was no insurance. The mill was built about two years ago, and had a capacity of 12,000 feet of lumber a day and employed eight men.

When the mill was erected a small depression near the fireback was left, and it is thought the gradual accumulation of particles of wood filled this depression and heat from the fireback started the blaze.

Revolutionists Executed.

London, July 6.—The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Mail reports that the steamer Columbia, which left Vladivostok on account of disturbances there, reports all shops and houses in Vladivostok closed by the police order of June 30th. Thirty ringleaders of the rioters were arrested, and eight big boxes of dynamite seized by the Cossacks.

The correspondent states the Russian volunteer steamer Kitat, laden with military stores, struck a mine in Possiet Bay and sank.

Executions in Harbin for connection with the revolutionary movement, the correspondent further says, number 600.

Scandinavian Singers Hold Festival.

La Crosse, Wis., July 6.—The eighth biennial musical festival of the Northwestern Scandinavian Singers' association will open here this evening with a grand concert. The city is already full of visitors who have come here from all parts of the Northwest and it is expected that the number of visitors during the four days of the festival will reach from five to eight thousand. An elaborate program has been arranged for this festival and the large chorus will be supported by a fine orchestra and several prominent soloists.

General Lee Is Put in Command.

Washington, July 5.—Orders issued at the war department yesterday assign Brigadier-General Jesse M. Lee to the command of the Visayas, Philippine Islands, with headquarters at Ilo Ilo, and Brigadier-General Walter Duggan, recently promoted from colonel of the first infantry to the command of the brigade camp established at Camp Stolzberg in Luzon. Both of these officers are now in the Philippines.
