One Day of Chatauqua Given
Over to Development

Ashland, July 16.—(Special.)—To-morrow there will be a monster meeting in this city. The Ashland Chatauqua will be in session at that date and this day is set aside as "Booster Day" under the auspices of the Rogue River Development League. It is earnestly desired that every man, woman and child in Jackson and Josephine counties should attend this meeting, as it is a business proposition and for the benefit for every man, woman and child in both counties.

The speakers are Tom Richardson of the State Development League, and E. Hofer, of the Willamette Valley Development League.

A special train will leave Grants Pass for Ashland at 8:30 a. m., and return leaving Ashland at 10 p. m. A special rate has been engaged of one fare for the round trip. This train will start at Grants Pass at 8:30 a. m., and stop at Woodville, Gold Hill, Gold Bay, Central Point, Medford, Phoenix and Talent.

RICHEST MAN IN THE WORLD

Went Over the Divide Leaving
Bushels of Diamonds,
and a Billion in Money

London, July 16.—Alfred Beit, the South African financier, died this morning.

(Alfred Beit is supposed to be, or, since he is dead, was supposed to be, the richest man in the world. Beside his wealth Rockefeller's millions pale into insignificance. He was the diamond king of South Africa, and head of the diamond syndicate that has been advancing the price of diamonds for the past two or three years. His wealth is estimated at much more than a billion dollars, he having in his vaults bushels of diamonds of incalculable value. And here comes the moral lesson—he left them.—Ed.)

DROWNED IN THE WILLAMETTE

Oregon City, Or., July 16.—Mrs. Marie Parks, of 16 Eleventh street, and Miss Anna Hartman, of 12 North Eleventh street, Portland, members of a picnic party, were drowned in the Willamette river at 11 o'clock yesterday morning.

Mrs. Parks, accompanied by her husband, W. A. Parks, and Miss Hartman, in company of M. H. Dodge, to whom she was engaged, came to Magone's Island to spend the day. Neither of the women could swim, but Dodge had accompanied Miss Hartman into shallow water when the young woman was carried off her feet into deeper water by the swells from a passing towboat. Dodge struggled bravely to bring his fiancée to a place of safety, and only abandoned the task when, exhausted, he was relieved by Parks, who rushed to the rescue.

Dodge then grasped a rope that was thrown to him, and was taken aboard. After striving for several minutes to bring the Hartman woman ashore, Parks failed, and as the young girl sank from sight he seized another rope and was taken out.

Observing the perilous predicament of her friends, and hearing the cries of her husband for help, Mrs. Parks became hysterical, and as Parks was making efforts to save Miss Hartman, she rushed to their aid. Being unable to swim, and with no one to aid her, Mrs. Parks drowned within a few minutes after reaching deep water.

The bodies of the two women were recovered within half an hour, but all efforts at resuscitation, in which Dr. H. S. Mount, who was called from this city, assisted, proved futile.

Coroner Holman was called to the scene of the double drowning, but since there were no circumstances requiring an official investigation, no inquest was held, and the bodies were taken to Portland.

DYNAMITE KNOCKED THEM OUT

The Superintendent Went
Along With the Hired Men
Which Makes Case Peculiar

Ashland, Wis., July 16.—Three men were killed and 20 injured today by an explosion in the plant of the Atlantic Dynamite Company, seven miles east of this city. J. L. Pearce, general superintendent; William Wallace and George Woodall are dead. The damage is \$100,000.

FOLLOWS HER TO CHURCH

Mrs. Esiaic Was Determined to
See Mrs. Roosevelt

Oyster Bay, July 15.—President and Mrs. Roosevelt attended services this morning at Christ church, in accordance with their usual custom. Mrs. A. L. Esiaic, who has made frequent visits to Oyster Bay for the purpose of obtaining an interview with Mrs. Roosevelt, after church, demanded that she be shown a seat immediately behind the President's pew. This was refused, and she was taken to a seat on the opposite side of the aisle, where she remained for a short time, and then went outside, where she waited until the President drove away without making any attempt to approach the carriage.

Boston, July 16.—Fannell Hall was threatened by a fire today that did \$50,000 damage to a six-story building opposite. This is the second time in a brief period that Fannell Hall has been threatened.

To Approve Bond Issue.

New York, July 16.—A special meeting of the stockholders of the Allis-Chalmers Company will be held here this afternoon, at which the plan for a \$15,000,000 bond issue is to be passed upon. The stockholders will also pass upon the conditional contract entered into by the directors with Sherrison, Hammill & Co., acting on behalf of a syndicate for the underwriting of \$12,000,000 of the issue, or such part of it as is not taken by the stockholders under their privilege of subscription at 80 and interest. The balance of the \$15,000,000 is to be retained in the company's treasury as working capital.

Convention of Coal Miners.

Cardonvale, Pa., July 16.—The annual convention of the Union Mine Workers of the first district, comprising Luzerne and Lackawanna counties, opened here today with a large attendance of delegates. The convention will probably last through the week, as there are many important matters to be considered. It is believed that the present district officers will be re-elected. Tomorrow the delegates will take a trip to Lake Lodore. There will be a large meeting which will be addressed by a number of prominent speakers.
