Rembrandt Festival at Leyden.

Leyden, July 14.—The great Rembrandt festival, arranged in honor of the 300th anniversary of the birth of Rembrandt Hermanszoon, better known in the art world as Rembrandt von Rhy, began here today. Rembrandt, undoubtedly the greatest of the numerous famous Flemish artists who were born in Leyden, has contributed more to the renown of his birthplace than any other man and his fame has spread throughout the entire civilized world. Although the exact date of his birth, even to the year, is still in dispute, the celebration was arranged for this month and this year and great efforts have been made to make this event memorable in the annals of art.

The celebration opened today with the unveiling of the memorial monument, a fine bust of Rembrandt, modelled after one of his most famous self-portraits. At the same time two highly interesting and important art exhibitions were opened, one, which is confined to paintings by Rembrandt, at the Leyden museum; the other, including works of other great masters born in Leyden, like Gerardt Doux, Jan Lievens, Frank van M. Miris, Gabriel Metz, Jan Steen, Jan van Goyen and others, at the University of Rapenburg.

The special exhibit of Rembrandt includes a number of paintings by that master which have never been exhibited in public before. Among them are the "Andromeda," found only a short time ago by Dr. A. Brodus; the "Saskia," found a few months ago in Friesland; and the magnificent work, "Christ and the Samaritan Woman," from the Shephard's collection. It also includes many fine works by Rembrandt loaned by collectors in various foreign countries.

Tri-Club Yacht Cruise.

Oyster Bay, L. I., July 14.—The fleets of the Corinthian Yacht club of Philadelphia, the Atlantic Yacht club and the Seawanhaka-Corinthian Yacht club are assembled in this bay and it never presented a prettier and livelier appearance than now. The anchorage is off the Seawanhaka-Corinthian Yacht club, where the yachts will remain over Sunday, until Monday morning, when the fleets will start on their ocean cruise. On Monday they will run to Shelter Island and probably remain there until Friday, when the fleets will sail to Newport and disband. The racing yachts will get back to Larchmont in time for the racing there, which will begin next Saturday. The visiting yachtsmen will be entertained by the Seawanhaka-Corinthian club over Sunday. There will be races from port to port during the cruise.

Hay and Oats.

There was an unusual shortage of hay and feed the past two years in Oregon. A great amount of hay and oats was shipped in. This farmers became large buyers of feed.

This year conditions will be reversed. There is abundance of feed crops to sell.

Oregon will have the heaviest hay and oats crop in many years. Oats have averaged about 30 cents per bushel for a number of years in Oregon.

This hay crop will be very heavy and indications are that baled hay will bring fair prices next winter. It is selling at \$12 per ton in many parts of Oregon.

All who can save hay should have it baled or put under cover to be baled in the winter.

There is scarcely a year that there is not a good demand for baled hay.

Hay and oats should not be sacrificed on account of apparent overproduction. Increased industrial activity will move them to consume it.

Coroner Clough, who went out to investigate the case. The coroner did not think it necessary to hold an inquest, and brought the body to his undertaking parlors.

The dead man was found lying under a large tree, his head resting on his left hand, which he had used for a pillow. By his side was found his pipe. He was a German or of German descent, and appeared to be about 45 or 50 years of age, 5 feet 8 inches tall, and probably weighed 150 pounds.

He had sandy hair, a mustache and a round, full face. He was dressed in working clothes, wore shabby pants and a coat of a brownish color. His feet were also brown. Mr. Clark, a farmer who resides in that neighborhood, believes him to be a man who came past his place last Friday, in search of work in the hay fields. As decomposition had already set in when the body was discovered, it is impossible to get an exact description. A search of the individual's clothes showed he had no money; all that was found on his person was a jack knife, a few matches and a little bottle containing a few morphine tablets.

There is no clue leading to the man's identity, as he had no papers or letters on him. Just when he died cannot be ascertained, for the body could not be seen from the road. The extreme heat of the past few days would necessarily hasten decomposition. The remains will be buried tomorrow morning.
