BATTERY "A" CAMPS IN SALEM

**Made Good March in Spite of
Dusty Roads and Hot
Weather**

Camp Williamson was again alive
with soldier boys yesterday. This
time in Battery "A," field artillery,
of Portland, that pitched camp at that
place. The soldiers arrived Sunday at
1:30 from Silverton, where they took
part in the dedication of the new
Woodman hall at that place. The offi-
cers in charge are: Captain H. U.
Welch, First Lieutenant Clark, Second
Lieutenant Randall, Junior Lieutenant
Burr, and Dr. W. E. Catell, surgeon.

The start from Silverton Salemward
was made at 8:30 in the morning, and
this battery came over the dusty roads
and through the depressing heat in
remarkably good time.
The march, however, has proven
somewhat trying on several of the
men, due in a great measure to the
excessive heat and the change of water.
Two of the artillerymen have been in-
disposed for the past three days and
have been quartered in the ambulance.
While their condition is not serious,
the physician thought best to give the
men immediate attention and to make
it as comfortable for them as possible
during this practice march. The two
boys who are ill are Garyetson and
Mays. Considering there are 65 men
in the battery and the trying climate
conditions of the last few days, the
health record is good, and the endur-
ance of the citizen soldiery is again
demonstrated.

The boys are unanimous in their
praise of the ration and cleanliness of
the cooking and of camp life in gen-
eral. All are pleased with the march
but are only sorry that the hot spell
had come at this juncture.

While attempting to prevent one of
the horses from running away while in
Silverton Artilleryman Foley was kick-
ed on the leg, but was not seriously
hurt.

Yesterday a goodly number of Salem
people went to the camp to see the sol-
diers. The battery has about 36 horses
and when they reached here yesterday
they were pretty tired, especially
those that were rented in Portland. The
horses secured from the farmers seem
to have stood the test of the march
much better than the city horses. Dur-
ing the day the horses were put in the
grove near the river bank, where the
shade is good.

Wanted a New Band Stand.

Among the splendid improvements
that are being made at the Wilson
Avenue Park there is one which should
deserve the prompt attention of the
avenue park board, and that is the
erection of a new band stand, built on
made in plans. The present stand is too
small to conveniently house Salem's
present fine musical organization. The
ceiling is too low, and much of the ef-
fect of the music is killed. Some advo-
cate this building of a band stand of
rectangular shape and of new design,
while others favor a stand of octo-
gonal shape, with a high ceiling, built
in mission style with the railroad eaves
and a floor area of about 20 feet in di-
ameter.

It is probable that the matter will
be taken up before the park board by
the members of the Salem Military
Band. It has been planned to repaint
the present band stand, but many think
that the money spent in that work
ought to be saved and placed in a
building fund for the new stand.

JUST SAWED WOOD

Dr. Mark Skiff has scored a lucky
hit in wood contracting. Some time
ago he went through the country
around Chemawa and purchased all
the wood that was cut last winter in
that neighborhood. He secured all the
big fir at \$3 per cord, and when bids
were asked for uses at the Salem In-
dian Training School at Chemawa, Dr.
Skiff put in a bid, offering wood at
\$3.85 per cord. There were no other
bids. This bid at \$3.85 was virtually
been accepted, as there is no likelihood
of any other bids being submitted be-
cause the wood is required to be cut
during the previous winter.

It is estimated that about 2000
cords will be used.

Bids for wood in the state institu-
tions are being asked for in the autumn
so that the accepted bidders may cut
their wood during the winter. The
United States government awards the
contract for the wood for the Indian
school in the spring and the wood for
this contract must necessarily be cut
the winter before.
