CITY COUNCIL BUSY

Chief Cornelius Still Holds His Job and Acts Like He Intended to Stay

The expected happened last night at the meeting of the city council and it turned out just as expected.

The probabilities are that Chief of Police Cornelius will continue to run his department and that Night Officer Longcor will take orders in the future from the chief and not from himself.

The council or his political sponsors. Mr. Longcor was present at the meeting and was an attentive listener until the matter was disposed of.

Then Chief Cornelius said to Police-

man Longcor: "You are excused."

"All right, sir," said Mr. Longcor,

and he picked up his hat and went out

into the night.

The sensation was sprung by Alder-

man Haas. He offered a resolution

with many whereof and wherefore,

that the city was being overrun and

infested with tramps and vagrants

begging from door to door, and that

this awful condition was almost un-

bearable from the fact that myriads

of hoboes were falling over each other

in frantic haste to reach Salem in

order to strike the people for handouts

and that the city marshal be and is

herby instructed to give each of the

political appointees written orders to

strictly enforce the laws against va-

grants and tramps.

Mr. Downing moved that this mo-

tion be placed on the table. The ayes

and noes were called for.

The mayor suggested that the prop-

er place for the resolution was the

committee on health and police. Mr.

Downing then moved that the com-

mittee on health and police take

charge of the resolutions.

Mr. Jacobs said with due candor and

deliberation that he thought the com-

mittee on health and police was not

sufficiently large to grapple with a

problem of such gigantic proportions

and he moved that the committee

be augmented by the addition of two or

three other aldermen. He said

there was a whole lot to this resolu-

tion and he desired to see it ventila-

ted.

"We are satisfied with the commit-

tee on health and police," said a half

dozen members sotto voce.

The vote was then taken and the

motion carried.

The committee on health and police

is composed of Aldermen Baker, Ache-

son and Jacob. Mr. Jacob, it is un-

derstood, is the minority member of the

committee. It is to him Mr. Longcor

owes his job. When an effort was

made to have Mr. Longcor appointed

to a place at the penitentiary on the

ground of his service to the Democrat-

ic party, and this failed, Mr. Jacob

took the matter up and got a motion

through the council to give him his

present job.

It is not believed, however, that

Alderman Jacob will carry the mat-

ter so far as to try to needlessly an-

noy Chief Cornelius.

The whole matter was over in a

few minutes and during most of this

time the proverbial pin could have

been heard to drop.

During this tense excitement Alder-

man John Bayne murmured: "let her

drop," but Mayor Waters didn't hear

him and the silence was not tested in

this official manner.

Just at this critical time Chief Cor-

nelius issued his official order No. 1.

He said to Policeman Longcor, "ski-

doe," and the night man "skidoed."

Saloon Men Refused License.

The only other exciting thing done

was the refusal of the council to grant

saloon license to Nusbaum Brothers

and J. C. Cooper until these firms pay

the city the amounts they owe for

back tax on slot machines. Mr. Cooper

is indebted \$123 and Nusbaum \$156.

This came up on their regular appli-

cation for renewal of licenses. The re-

cordeur stated that these back debts

were hanging over them, and the coun-

cil, on motion, decided not to take ac-

tion until the debts were paid.

Mr. Moore, the recorder, then said

that a charge was pending against Mr.

Cooper for selling liquor on Sunday,

and the council decided not to take

action on his application until that mat-

ter is investigated.

and Mission.

and Twelfth.

It was ordered that this ordinance

be published in the Capital Journal

and the Statesman for five insertions.

A motion to furnish \$200 worth of

rock for the improvement of 300 feet

on Broadway was referred to the com-

mittee on streets.

Mr. Jacob moved that \$400 be ex-

pende in the improvement of Broad-

way but it received no second.

An amount not to exceed \$50 was ap-

propriated to repair the sleeping rooms

in the city hall for the firemen.

The saloon license of William Ander-

son was renewed.

The amount due Contractor Emerson

for the city's part of the repairs done

on the steel bridge was ordered paid.

The city attorney reported that the

Southern Pacific Railroad Company

owned in fee simple the strip of land

on which the penitentiary spur is laid,

and that there is no way to have the

fences removed, except by ordinary

condemnation proceedings.

Council authorized the purchase of

15 tons of hay for the use of the fire

department.

It was decided to employ a substi-

tute driver for the fire department to

act while the regular force are at their

meals, at a cost not to exceed \$10 per

month. The election of this officer was

deferred until the next meeting.

The fire committee was authorized to

advertise for 500 feet of hose.

The following bids for the construction

of the reinforced arch over Mill

creek on Commercial street were read

and referred to the committee on

bridges: Standard Construction Com-

pany, of Portland, \$6450; same firm,

alternative bridge, \$6000, General Con-

struction Company, of Portland, \$5600.
