An interesting program has been prepared for the meeting. One of the principal subjects that will come up for discussion will be the plan for a movement in favor of the unification of the food legislation in the various states of the Union. Sporadic efforts in that direction have been made in various states, but so far no organized movement has been started to that effect.
