Alabama Baptists Meet.
Talladega, Ala., July 18.—The Alabama Baptist state convention was opened here this morning with a prayer service under the direction of the Rev. A. G. Spinks. It was followed by a regular business session. The welcoming address was delivered by Mr. W. B. Castleberry and several of the visiting delegates responded. After some routine business had been transacted, the Rev. W. M. Blackwelder delivered the convention sermon. The business session will be continued in the afternoon and in the evening there will be a foreign mission session when the report of the year will be submitted by Mr. J. J. Hagood. The convention will last three days.
At the opening session this morning President Montague of Howard College announced that the \$100,000 endowment fund, which was launched at last year's convention at Sheffield, has been raised.

Newport, Yaquina Bay, Breitenbush Hot Springs from All S. P. and C. & E. Points.
On and after June 1, 1906, the Southern Pacific, in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad from points on their lines to Newport, Yaquina and Detroit at very low rates, good for return until October 10, 1906.
Three-day tickets to Newport and Yaquina, good going Saturdays and returning Mondays are also on sale from all East Side points, Portland to Eugene, inclusive, and from all West Side points, enabling people to visit their families and spend Sunday at the seaside.
Season tickets from all East Side

points, Portland to Eugene, inclusive, and from all West Side points, are also on sale to Detroit at very low rates, with stop-over privileges at Mill City or any point east, enabling tourists to visit the Santiam and Breitenbush Hot Springs in the Cascade mountains, which can be reached in one day.
