PRUNE CROP GOOD

The Glad Sunshine Didn't Do a Thing To the Prunes but Make Them Grow

Prune indications point to a splendid crop of prunes in the Willamette valley this fall. Of course it is too early in the season to prophesy with any degree of certainty but some indications are very encouraging and are by no means in the way of over-estimating the crop.

Statements have been gathered and collected that the recent hot weather had injured the prunes and was causing them to fall from the trees.

While this is true in a way, the crop will have a more prolific yield than is good for either the grower or the fruit.

Unless a large quantity of the prunes fall to the ground before they mature, the harvest will be so abundant that the fruit will be small in size and of inferior quality, and, moreover, the weight will be so heavy that the branches will not sustain it.

For this reason the experienced pruner grows prunes upon the late but not on a heavy crop.

Several years ago, the trees were heavily laden with fruit, but as they were this year and the season was not so hot and dry, the crop of the fruit fell off. As a result nearly all the prunes in the valley were broken by the weight of the fruit and the prunes that year were small.

The most conservative growers believe that the crop this year will be a bumper one and that the quality will be of the best and this will be one of the reasons for prices to be good.

California buyers are sending out circulars and letters to the effect that the California crop this year will be 300,000,000 pounds as against 150,000,000 pounds that were estimated thirty days ago. It is difficult to know if this is a correct estimate or whether the California buyers desire to keep prices down.

N. W. Clark, who has five acres of fine prunes near this city said this morning that he never saw better prunes in Oregon than those that are growing on his place and that the only fault he has to find with the conditions is that there is too much of the fruit on the trees.

A. Vardier, who has a fine orchard about three miles from this city, says the outlook for the prune crop is very promising, in fact it will be larger than that of any previous year. He stated that the Indian prunes were dropping somewhat earlier than usual, a fact due to the hot weather, but the trees are so loaded with fruit that it is really a good thing that some of it is falling. The trees will be able to give more nourishment to the fruit, and the quality and size will be increased thereby.

Though the crop promises to be unusually large, the growers in that section will be amply able to handle the crop.
