ASKS FOR ACCOUNTING.

Petition for Writ of Habeas and Com-
plaint in Oscar Cole Adminis-
trator Suit.

A petition for a writ of review and
a complaint was filed last evening in
department No. 2 of the circuit court
by W. H. Holmes and Webster Holmes
against Oscar Cole, both as an individ-
ual and as administrator of the estate
of Levi Bartmess.

The plaintiffs allege that Mr. Cole
has not properly accounted for all the
estate, and on the other hand the de-
fendant asks that the attorneys turn
over, approximately \$1000 alleged to
belong to the estate.

Bartmess died at Canemah, Clacka-
mas county, and Oscar Cole and Henry
Cole are the heirs at law of the es-
tate.

Not a Hop Dream.

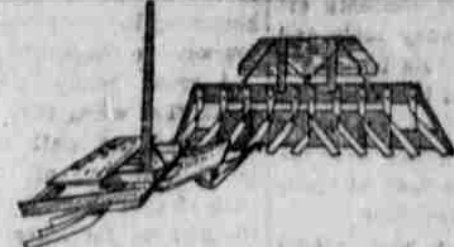
The "High jinks of the hopmen,"
which will be pulled off at the Krebs
farm near Independence Saturday,
promises to be one of the social events
of the season. There will be music
and a splendid dinner will be served
to the guests, who will number about
forty.

It will be a stag affair, and a gen-
eral good time is anticipated. Some
matters of business, of interest to hop
dealers and growers, will probably be
discussed.

The hop market seems to be improv-
ing. Contracts are reported to have
been made at 12 cents, and some of the
local buyers are said to offer even
more. As a whole the present season
bids fair to be more profitable to the
grower than that of a year ago.

There is one firm in Salem that nev-
er finds fault with conditions, and
that is Rostein & Greenbaum. While
some merchants complain that the trade
the past year has been slow on account
of poor crops, cheap hops, Lewis and

known, for the reason that crops are
immense, and the prospect for prices is
