GREAT STATE FAIR

Meeting This Fall Will Break All Records, in Both Races and Exhibits

Preparations for the approaching fair are moving along very satisfactorily. Secretary Durbin has returned from Portland, where he has been in the interest of the enterprise. Nearly all the counties in the state are awakening to the importance of the fair, and a great many of them will be on hand this year with good exhibits of their products.

We have always looked on the fair as a Marion county pumpkin. "said a prominent man from Marion county yesterday, "but we now begin to realize that we were mistaken, and that the big expositions are under the auspices of the state and of agriculture are state institutions, and mean as much for Malheur, Clatsop, Coos and Curry counties as they do for Marion and Polk."

Many of the counties are taking up the suggestion that they make exhibits of a permanent character, and the best part of them for use at the Jamestown exposition next year. It has been advised by the James River commissioners, and will probably be kept in mind by a number of the delegates.

Additional stables of horses will be at the fair grounds this week. Some of the best horses in the West are here, and all indications tend to show that the races will be the best held on the Pacific coast.

CHERRY & BERRY SEASON WILL CLOSE NEXT WEEK

Salem Mutual Cannery Will Go On Vacation in One Week—Management Preparing for Big Campaign in Pears and Apples

What may be termed the first semester of the plant of the Salem Mutual Cannery will close about the middle of next week.

The cherry season will close for 1906 Saturday, and the cannery will be kept running three or four days longer canning raspberries. After that time there will be a vacation until September 15 or 20, when the fall work will begin on pears.

All late cherries and berries that have been contracted for, however, will be received at the cannery and full contract prices paid for them and if the quantities received justify it, they will be canned here, otherwise the fruit will be shipped to Portland where canneries will still be in operation. In either event the fruit grower will get the full market price.

Just now the employees of the cannery are very busily engaged in casing the products of the past month for shipment. All the output of the the Salem Mutual was sold to one firm in Portland. This firm puts the product in the open market and the product of the factory is shipped all over the country. This firm has advised Manager Kimball that the demand for high grade canned fruits is very good this year and that the out-

put of the Salem canneries rank very high.

It is understood that the crop of pears in Marion and Polk counties this year will be very large and that the pears will be of excellent quality. At least it seems so now. Manager Kimball says that he believes that he will be ready to begin operations again at the cannery by September 15, or at any rate four or five days from that date, and that he will give employment to at least 200 girls. This will mean a considerable increase in the pay roll as only 130 girls were employed during the cherry and berry season.

The season for pears will last for a month or two and will not be over when the work of canning apples begins.

The Salem Mutual Cannery will be in operation next year from the time the earliest strawberries are ripe until late in the fall if the management can procure the fruit. The stockholders will be glad to double the capacity or to increase it even more than that if the farmers and fruit growers will co-operate with them.

It is up to the farmers of Marion and Polk counties to make of Salem one of the biggest centers for canned fruits in the United States.

Ten Deaths From Consumption.

Tuberculosis was responsible for the death of ten persons in Walla Walla during April, May and June, according to the quarterly vital statistics report, issued by County Auditor Honeycutt today for the state medical board. The report shows that there were 59 deaths in Walla Walla the past three months, tuberculosis, pneumonia, and heart disease being responsible for 20 of these.
