MANY MORMONS NAMED

Of Course They Understand Irrigation, but Still There Are Others

Governor Chamberlain this morning appointed 15 delegates from Oregon to the National Irrigation Congress at Boise, Idaho, which will be held from September 3 to 8, inclusive. Under the rule of the congress the body is composed of 15 delegates from each state, ten from each city of more than 25,000 population, 5 from each city of less than that, 2 from each chamber of commerce and similar bodies, 2 from each irrigation and horticultural society and 2 from each agricultural college.

The delegates appointed by Governor Chamberlain are: A. D. Stillman, of Pendleton; C. M. Redfield, of Redmond; Zerah Snow, of Portland; S. D. Peterson, of Athena; Will M. Peterson, of Athena; F. N. Sheffield, of Ontario; D. C. Brownell, of Ontario; E. M. Brannock, of Portland; F. W. Triplett, of Bend; C. M. Mallett, of Ontario; F. M. Bramwell, of La Grande; C. W. Nibley, of La Grande; W. D. Barnes, of Laidlaw; H. F. Jones, of Redmond.

All the different phases of irrigation will be discussed at the congress and especial interest will be taken with the growth of sugar beets. This will be of special interest to the farmers of the Willamette valley. Recent developments show that irrigation in this valley is coming into prominence and within a few years the people in the valley counties will be as vitally interested in irrigation as the farmers in Eastern Oregon are.

The city of Salem is entitled to five delegates and the Oregon Agricultural College and the Salem Commercial Club to two each. It is to be hoped that men will be appointed who will attend, in order that the valley may be represented.

SAYING NOTHING AT ALL

The canning of Professor Drew by the trustees of Willamette University, like the spook of the late lamented Mr. Banquo, refused to stay where it was placed.

It will be remembered that when Mr. Drew was given his conge, the ministerial association immediately took up arms, and the public was led to expect that the trustees would at once be forced to back pedal, or the streets of Salem would be a sea of blood. In this case the expected did not happen, and the resolution the preachers passed on the Drew question, and gave out for publication, was as mild as circus lemonade. They were of the "we resolve to regret" kind, and were as inane and harmless as a doctrinal sermon on infant damnation.

But it seemed that the ministers played a deep game. They gave out a milk and water set of resolutions to appease an excited populace, and at the same time sent in another set of demands and remonstrances to the board of trustees, at the recent meeting of that body in Portland.

It is said that the demands made by the preachers on the trustees were sufficiently strongly worded to cause the board of trustees to send an answer to the ministers, explaining all the little delicate points in the Drew incident.

Neither the Ministerial Association nor the board of trustees of the University have decided whether to make public the letter of demand and the reply.
