

## COOKE PATTON IMPRESSED WITH CALIFORNIA

### Salem Man Says Capital City Ought to Have Paved Streets, More Progress and Less Petty Jealousies

Cooke Ate an Orange in a California Town and They Made Him Tote the Debris Five Blocks Before He Could Find a Dirty Spot to Chuck it

"I ate an orange on the street in Redlands, California," said Cooke Patton, "and the street looked so nice and clean that I had to pack the peelings five blocks before I could find a place to throw them away."

Mr. Patton is just back from an extended tour through Southern California, and while away he has become an enthusiast for civic reform and municipal progress.

"I had been away so long," said Cooke, "that I had forgotten how much like a field of hay some of the Salem streets looked, and the tall timothy in some of our thoroughfares made me ashamed; it actually did."

"All of the streets in all of the Southern California towns that I visited are paved; not only the sidewalks, but the entire streets. Asphalt is mostly used and the streets are kept scrupulously clean, and you have no idea how much it improves business, adds to the comfort of the people and the favorable impression it makes on visitors."

Mr. Patton stayed in Long Beach a great deal of the time he was in California and he was very favorably impressed with the Y. M. C. A. building and the swimming pool in that resort. He says Salem should wake up and raise money to build a \$10,000 swimming pool. There is nothing like it, he says.

"Yes, and I skated, too," continued the returned traveler. "In California they all skate to music, dance to music, swim to music and eat to music."

"In Long Beach," he said, "they are building two new streets more than a mile long, paved with asphalt, and I watched the construction of these thoroughfares with a great deal of interest."

"I wish we could have something like it in Salem."

"In Redlands," Mr. Patton explained, "the city council offers prizes each month for the best kept lawn; prizes for the second and third best and honorable mention for a number of others. In this way a spirit of friendly rivalry is kept up and all the householders in the city vie with each other to see who can win the most prizes and keep the prettiest and neatest lawns."

"That could be done in Salem without much cost."

In talking of other civic work in California towns, Mr. Patton said he was more impressed with the unanimity of the people than by any other feature. In all of the towns, no matter how small, the citizens worked together on all propositions for the public good.

"In Long Beach, in one week," he said, "they raised \$250,000 to erect one manufacturing plant and I saw them raise \$20,000 in twenty minutes to build a Y. M. C. A. home."

"It's the same way all over the state. I saw them start whole train loads of Elks from all the different cities to the Elk gathering at Denver. Each town met the expense by contributing a train load of its specialty. Fresno gave a car load of raisins. Bakersfield contributed a tank of wine, and so on, all through the state."

Mr. Patton also went down to San Diego, and he said the board of trade had people on the train to meet visitors an hour or more from the city and supplied them with local newspapers and all kinds of guide books and literature that told everything about the city. Visitors reached San Diego with a pretty good knowledge of what they were going to see, and knew what to ask for first.

While on this visit Mr. Patton met many people who formerly lived in Salem. At Los Angeles he saw Mrs. Fore, formerly Miss Ollie Bridges of this city; Willard Leonard, managing the Pacific coast tours; Gus Bynon, an old time Salem newspaper man, who founded an afternoon newspaper in this city with the avowed intention of putting the Capital Journal "on the hog," but who has since reformed and has gone into the more elevating occupation of selling real estate; young Darby, formerly Mr. Wiggins' man; Will Plasterer, who is a floor walker in a big store; Mrs. Sanford Watson, who runs a flower stand; Joe Evans, who manages the hat department in a store, and who used to be in the Woolen Mills store here.

At San Diego Mr. Patton ran across T. Holverson, who conducted a store in Salem. His health is bulky and he can now do all kinds of hard work.

While at the ostrich farm at Pasadena, Mr. Patton met Mrs. A. T. Gilbert, Mrs. Nellie Staden and Lloyd Cooper.

"Gee," said Mr. Patton, "why, in Long Beach the price of gas is 75 cents per thousand, and they are talking of a reduction in the price. You know in Salem we have to pay \$2.00 per thousand. In our rooms there we only paid \$1.00 per month and we used more gas than we pay \$5.00 for in this city."

are reported from Central Japan and all railroad service is interrupted. The Kofu district has been converted into a huge lake and damage amounting to several million yen has been done. Thousands have taken refuge in temples and theatres on the roofs of their houses.

It is feared the death list will be appalling, as 4000 houses are reported partially submerged. At the Matsumoto copper mines all work had to be suspended, and the works are under a variety of water.

The latest reports place the death list at nearly 1000, but communication is interrupted and details are hard to obtain. It is greatly feared, however, that this figure will be multiplied enormously when the particulars are received. The government is taking prompt action to relieve the distress and rescue those who are still in peril.
