The North Fairview Mining Com-
 pany, operating in the Bohemia dis-

Just an Opinion.

Attorney-General Crawford has ren-
 dered an opinion to the effect that a
 citizen who has purchased real estate
 on the installment plan is not entitled
 to vote in a district school election by
 virtue of that purchase. The opinion
 was given at the request of Superin-
 tendent of Schools Ackerman. Mr.
 Crawford, in his opinion, says the pur-
 chase of property on the installment
 plan gives the purchaser an equity
 right in the property, and that the
 supreme court has held that an equity
 right title is taxable, but that the equity
 right is not complete until all the
 payments are made, and therefore the
 purchaser cannot exercise the rights of
 a freeholder until the title is secured.
