Thaw Would not Stand for Her Girls Ears and Feet

Chronicle of July 14 says: Harshaw has dismissed the firm of O. Leott, Gruber & Bonyng as counsel and engaged Clifford W. Edge, who married a daughter of late Supreme Court Justice Leslie Russell. To Eradicate a Mining Evil. The protection of the mining industry of the United States, the American Mining Congress has established a bureau of inquiry through which information can be obtained as

to the condition of the property and the standing of the company that has asked or is asking for the money of the investor.

The American Mining Congress is a national organization of mining men, the directors of which are men of the highest standing in their own states, whose only interest is the uplifting of the mining industry. To this end, and among other things, the organization is working for the creation of a department of Mines and Mining as a separate department of the national government, and for the enactment of laws in the various states making the concealment or misrepresentation of any material fact concerning a mine upon which a fraudulent sale of stock is predicated a criminal offense.

In order that its board of directors may be kept in touch with the general sentiment of the mining world an annual session is held to which delegates are sent by the president of the United States, the governors of the several states, the mayors of cities, and the commercial bodies of America. At its permanent headquarters at Denver, Colorado, under the direction of its secretary, a regular force is constantly employed in carrying on its work, no small part of which will be the protection of investors against swindling frauds, to the end that mining may be placed more and more on an investment rather than a speculative basis.

This Bureau of Industry will be absolutely impartial in its findings, its sole purpose being to prevent ill-advised mining investments and to save the West from the disgrace which follows dishonest mining promotion.

In order to thoroughly eradicate the fake promotion, the American Mining Congress is pledged to give to inquiring members information absolutely unbiased, collected from unprejudiced sources, largely its own trusted correspondents, and to have, but one end in view—the protection of the investor its belief being that every dollar improperly invested is a damage to all legitimate mining, and that the highest good of the mining industry may be served by warning investors against improper investments and furnishing such information as will guide them into channels which give promise of success.

WHEN SHOULD THEY MARRY

Surprise and amazement following the lecture of Professor Charles Zueblin, of the University of Chicago, at Chicago Tuesday night, in which he advocated "probationary marriage," has given away to indignant protest and a demand that the dissemination of such radical and revolutionary views at the midway seat of learning cease. Trustees of the university are being told on all sides that the delivery of the sensational lecture marks the point where the application of a curb is imperative and emphasizes the immediate necessity of the appointment of a strong head to succeed the late President Harper and guide the destinies of the great school.

Startling Views of Marriage.

Here are some of the things Professor Zueblin said in his lecture: "There can be and are holier alliances without the marriage bond than within it." "Marriages in the United States are nothing but property arrangements." "Women are merely dupes for men under the cloak of marriage relationship." "Every mortal man or woman has room for more than one person in the heart." "Our attitude toward Gorky and his wife was nothing but hydrophobia." "Our present attitude toward marriage makes friendship impossible." **Man and Woman Defined.** "Man is beefy and animal; woman hysterical and deformed." "Most people are dirty physically and mentally and morally." "No clean minded person can object to the nude." "Like politics and religion we have taken for granted that the marriage

relationship was right and have not questioned it."

"Our society will not bear examination."

"For the sake of the children we must have a legal marriage."

"A probationary marriage should precede all other marriages."

"Motherhood is the chief interest of the human race."

"Man bellows when he is hurt."

"The luxuries of the rich Chicagoans correspond to the prizefights of the laborers."

"Man's dress is ludicrous."

"Most Chicagoans have neither the opportunity nor the desire to remove the dirt."

"Ignorance of the body is responsible for much of the uncleanness."

"The comment of the critics upon Shaw's plays have been positively indecent."

Gorky Much Married.

"Gorky is much more married than many Americans."

"We are much more concerned with the label than with anything else, as far as marriage is concerned."

"Marriage is simply a machine for the propagation of the species."

"The property idea is what has degraded marriage."

Trustee Amazed and Shocked.

Trustee D. G. Hamilton, when asked for his view of Professor Zueblin's expressions, said:

"I just now saw the quotations from the lecture by the professor, and am amazed. No right minded man can agree with such statements impugning the integrity of the home. For myself personally, I frown upon such attacks. As a trustee of the university, I frown upon the use by any man in his position as a professor in the University of Chicago, and the weight the position carries, to disseminate statements inimical to the sanctity of the home, such as those quoted today."

WALLA WALLA WALLA STREETS

"Walla Walla, Wash., is a much smaller town than Salem as far as population is concerned," said Eben LaFore this morning, "but the people there certainly have Salem skinned when it comes to streets and sidewalks."

Mr. LaFore, who is a member of the grocery firm of John Hughes, has just recently been to Walla Walla and frequently stops in that town. He has always noted the pavements there and has looked into the proposition and talked with the street commissioner, and the business man of that city on the subject.

"Nearly all the business streets in Walla Walla are paved," said Mr. LaFore, "either with asphalt or bituminous and they go in for wide sidewalks. Most of the sidewalks are widened out to twenty feet, and are graded to the level of the center of the street. All of the streets there are as wide as the Salem streets and the paved thoroughfares and wide walks adds greatly to the appearance of the buildings and to the city. Most of the merchants there that I talked with said that beyond question the appearance of the streets made general business better, that it gave the town a more civilized appearance, added to the pleasure and convenience of the people who came to town to trade and to market and was unquestionably an important factor in the city's prosperity."

Jerome to Speak in Birmingham. Birmingham, Ala., July 20.—The annual banquet of the board of trade of this city, which will take place this evening, promises to be a memorable affair, owing to the fact that William Travers Jerome, the district attorney of New York, will be the guest of honor of the evening, and will deliver the principal address. It is expected that municipal reform and purity of politics in general will be the topic of his address.

To Abolish Tooth Emblem.

There is a possibility that the present national convention of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, now in session at Denver this week, will take decisive action to abolish the elk tooth as the emblem of that order. The Elks of Colorado are behind the movement, and there are 21 lodges of that order in the state, and they expect to be successful in their efforts.

One of the leaders in the movement is John A. McGuire, editor of Outdoor Life, a well-known sporting paper of Denver. He states that a connected move is to be made by the sportsmen of the Western states to have the grand lodge take some action toward either completely abolishing the use of teeth in the future or at least discourage the practice. He declares that it is a fact that many trappers and hunters in Wyoming and Utah make a specialty of killing both bull and cow elk for the purpose of securing teeth. He states that the carcasses are left to rot after the teeth are removed.
