LEBANON MILLS ARE BURNED

Loss About \$15,000 and Insurance One Third of That Amount

The Albany Herald of Sunday says: The Lebanon sawing mill, the property of J. H. Dracks, were destroyed by fire at a late hour last night, with the contents, and the entire plant is a total loss. The fire was discovered at a little before 11 o'clock, when an alarm was quickly turned in. The flames at that time were breaking through the roof, and the inside of the mill was a seething mass of fire.

The fire department quickly responded to the alarm, and it was discovered when the line of hose was laid and no water was thrown that a rock had been wedged tightly into the nozzle and knots tied in the line of hose. By the time these matters were straightened out the fire was beyond all control, and all the firemen could do was to prevent the fire from reaching other nearby buildings.

There is no question but that the fire was of incendiary origin. It had evidently been carefully set in the building, perhaps in several places, and when it was discovered the flames had invaded every part of the plant, the interior of the mill being a seething furnace of flame.

The loss on building and stock will aggregate about \$15,000, while Mr. Drack's insurance on the property was only about \$5,000. This is the second attempt to burn the mill in a few months. Some months ago fire was discovered in the mill late one night, but by good work on the part of the firemen and the citizens generally the flames at that time were subdued without much harm resulting to the property. At that time there were evidences of incendiarism and a thorough investigation was made, but the guilty parties could not be discovered. Tonight's fire was a repetition of the attempt to burn out Mr. Dracks, and it proved successful beyond the wildest dreams of the fiends who had the matter in hand.

There is no explanation as to any reason why the attempt to burn the mill was made. Mr. Dracks has no enemies here who would stoop to such a deed, he has not made himself obnoxious in public matters as they come up, and the people are at a loss to account for the villainous work of the fire fiend. A thorough investigation will be made, and should the guilty party be discovered an example will be made of him.
